





The Story of the "Y" Stadium

HOUGH Brigham Young University was the last of the three institutions of higher learning in Utah to have a stadium ready for play, it was the first, far as we can discover, to project such an undercing. As far back as 1923 the graduating class of that ar used the stadium as its project. Since that time actically every class that has left the institution has ide a similar contribution.

On "Y" Day, 1924, the student body assisted in ring the first drains leading to the project, but it was it until Mr. R. A. Hart drew plans for the complete ainage system in 1926, that the stadium got truly under 45.

Mr. Joseph Nelson, of Provo, chairman of the architural section of the Utah Academy of Arts and Letrs and a man who has some splendid buildings to his edit in Utah, drew the plans for the completed strucre and Elmer Jacobs, civil engineer, worked out the tails of construction and had charge of the grading d building program. Mr. C. A. Talboe, of Provo, d the concrete and wood work.

The field was first leveled, after which the track as constructed with a 220 straightaway. The hillside as brought down to grade and the actual laying of e concrete began during the early summer. The first it of the structure was practically completed for the st football game of the season this year, that between righam Young and the College of Idaho on September ber by the date of the dedication game, October 27, the 'st unit was entirely completed including the press box ected by Z. C. M. I., the score board donated by the alt Lake Tribune, and the flag pole contributed by e Crane Company.

The stadium is located on a natural site where a dehill formed ages ago possibly by Provo river and take Bonneville in cooperation with each other, furished the base for the seats which rise 55 rows high in the eastern side of the playing field, backed by Squaw eak, the "Y" mountain, and in the distance, by Provo eak. The architect's plan calls eventually for a bowl attending around the north end and along the west side. The south side will be ornamented by fine lofty columns f concrete. Columns will also extend along the summit if the hill above the seats which are now installed taking of the place a splendid ampitheatre.

The first unit consists of 5,508 seats. The construcon is of concrete with iron braces rising above which apport red wood planks for the seats. The entire strucure and field are surrounded by a substantial net wire ance.

The financing was done through the Student's upply association, the various classes, and by means f the sale of stadium privileges which range from life



Scene at dedication services of Brigham Young University Stadium

Amid the color and crispness of a new autumn day, October 27, 1928, officials, football fans, players, and friends of the Brigham Young University gathered to witness and take part in the dedication of the new stadium. Old glory for the first time streamed from on high over the vastness of the new playing field. President Harris presented the structure to the Trustees of the institution, and the gift was accepted by President Heber J. Grant.

The occassion was memorable, for it marked the completion of a worthy project, and one which deserved the plaudits of all Utah people. Every college in the state now has a stadium.

privileges for \$500 and \$1,000 to tickets for the dedication game for \$5.00. Of course the management of the stadium looks upon these sales in a measure as real gifts to the project.

Three games of collegiate standing have been played on the new field. The dedication was celebrated with a game between brother-coached teams—Brigham Young University Cougars and the Utah Aggies coached by Ott and Dick Romney respectively.

Many who sat in the stadium for the opening games maintained it was worth the price of admission to come and just "look" for two hours at the surrounding landscape.

No cars can be parked on h South and any cars attempting this approach will unred aside and directed to Fourth South. If you roach the stadium from Fourth South then you can th all the available parking space near and around stadium.

Exits

The stadium is built with exits sufficiently large to ble the crowd to leave within a very short period. rance tickets are so printed that upon showing them an attendant, he will direct you to the entrance



which will get you to your seat the quickest way possible.

Our patrons are requested to leave the field by the same gates and entrances through which they entered. If this is done, patrons will be more satisfied because of the relief from congestion. Please do not jump over the front of stand and seek exit by walking over the track or gridiron. There are no large gates on this route and you will waste your time and be delayed.

A new exit has been provided for the convenience of the patrons. A cement stairway has been constructed on the west side near the north end of the stadium. Those sitting on the north sections of the west side of the stadium will find it expedient to leave by this exit.

Special street cars are available for each game, and these cars will bring you within a very short distance from the gates. Catch street cars which are numbered 5 and designated East First South, and you will experience no difficulty whatever in finding your way to the playing field.

T^O AID the University of Utah in making its stadium one of the most complete and modern in the country, The Salt Lake Tribune, with true community spirit, in addition to its help in the stadium drive, has presented to the stadium a radio broadcasting station, a public address system, and a great scoreboard with electric timing system. A composite photograph and drawing of The Tribune's fine gift to the University is seen above. Improved on a bird's eye view of the stadium in The Tribune scoreboard which gives all of the figures of play, all penalties, and interesting information and by its electrically operated clock the time to play.

In the press box The Tribune has installed a special broadcasting station through which the broadcast of the games goes out over KSL's new 5000 watt station to the entire West. The play by play broadcast of the games, also furnished by The Tribune is heard in .Canada, in all Western States, in Northern Mexico and even as far as Honolulu.

Connecting the press box with the scoreboard is a special underground conduit with the timer wires. Running from the broadcasting station in the press box to the northwest corner of the playing field in a conduit with the broadcasting equipment, and from this the wires run entirely around the field. On this system the eighteen control boxes whereby the play can be h cast from any section of the field. All timer, board equipment and radio and public address s wires are in underground conduits, the most moder most acceptable equipment known to radio, and installed this spring at a great cost by The Tribu:

The University of Utah has not been alone in the beneficiary of the kindness of Utah's great mountain newspaper. In Provo The Tribune also sented to the Cougar stadium a scoreboard and se similar to that given to the state school. These s boards are so huge and so efficient that spectato the most remote corners of the gigantic stadium see every figure and every report with ease.
