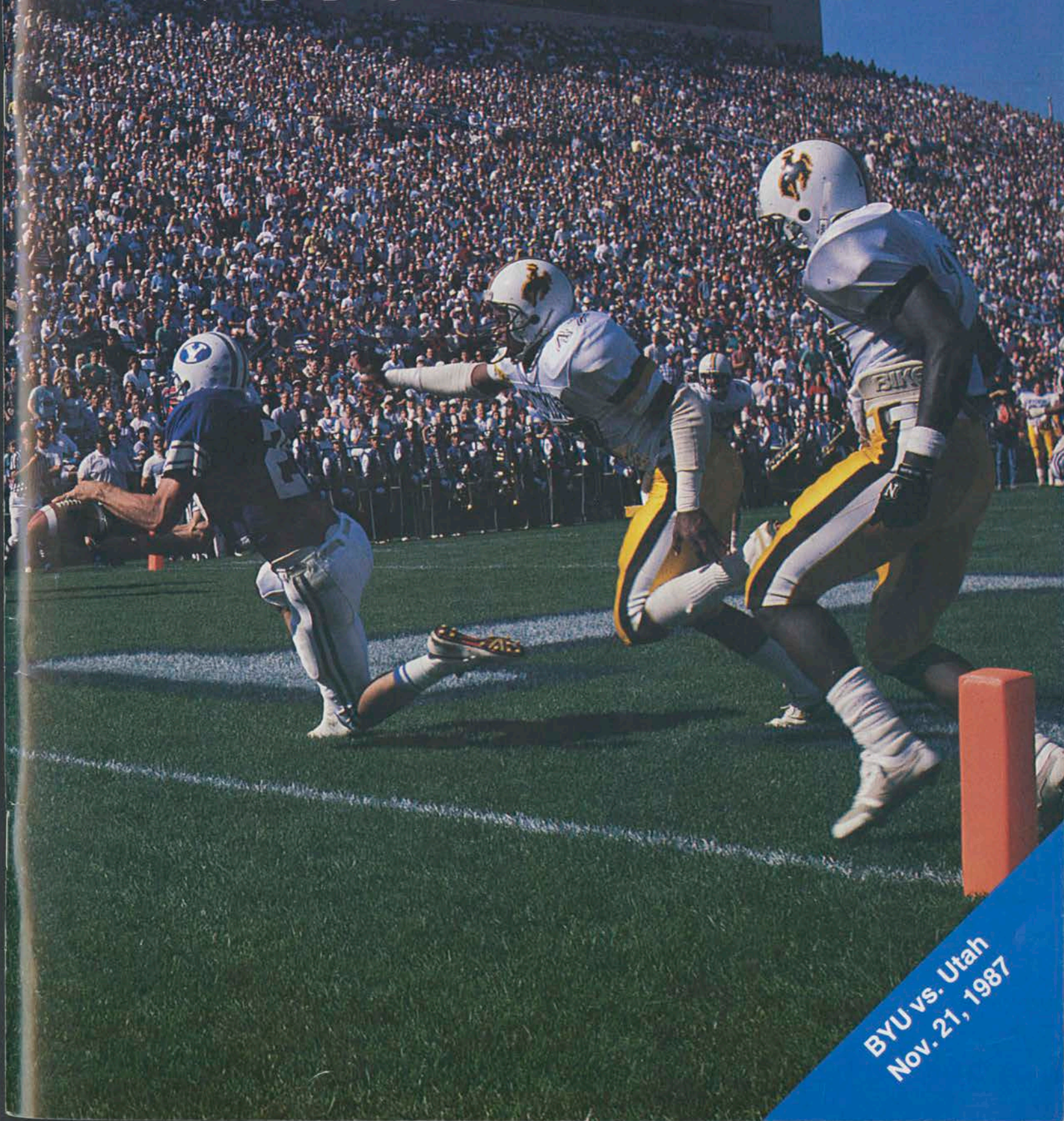

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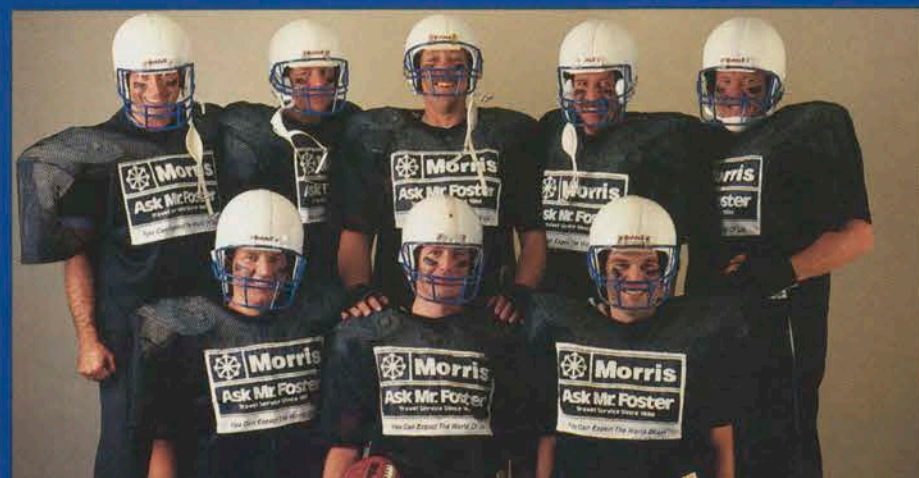

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Today's Game: BYU vs. Utah



The oldest rival in BYU's football history, Utah, is the Cougars' opponent this afternoon.

Utah owns a 39-19-4 lead in the series which officially began in 1922. However, BYU has won eight straight and 14 of the 15 under LaVell Edwards.

BYU enters today's game with a 7-3 record and is 5-1 in the Western Athletic Conference. The Cougars can still win at least a share of the league title and are eyeing a post-season bowl appearance.

Utah is 5-6 on the year and in seventh place in the WAC with a 2-5 mark. The Utes wind up the season today and would nothing better than to derail the Cougars.

Today is the final home game of the season for the Cougars and marks the last Cougar Stadium appearance for 22 seniors. The group includes four starters on offense and six on defense plus kickers Leonard Chitty and Chris Germann.

On the offensive side, BYU loses standout linemen Brian Rodoni and John Borgia and star wide receivers Rich Zayas and David Miles. The defense will lose nose guard David Futrell, defensive tackle Steve Kaufusi, linebackers Richard Hobbs, Thor Salanoa and J.C. Von Colln, and defensive back Rodney Thomas.

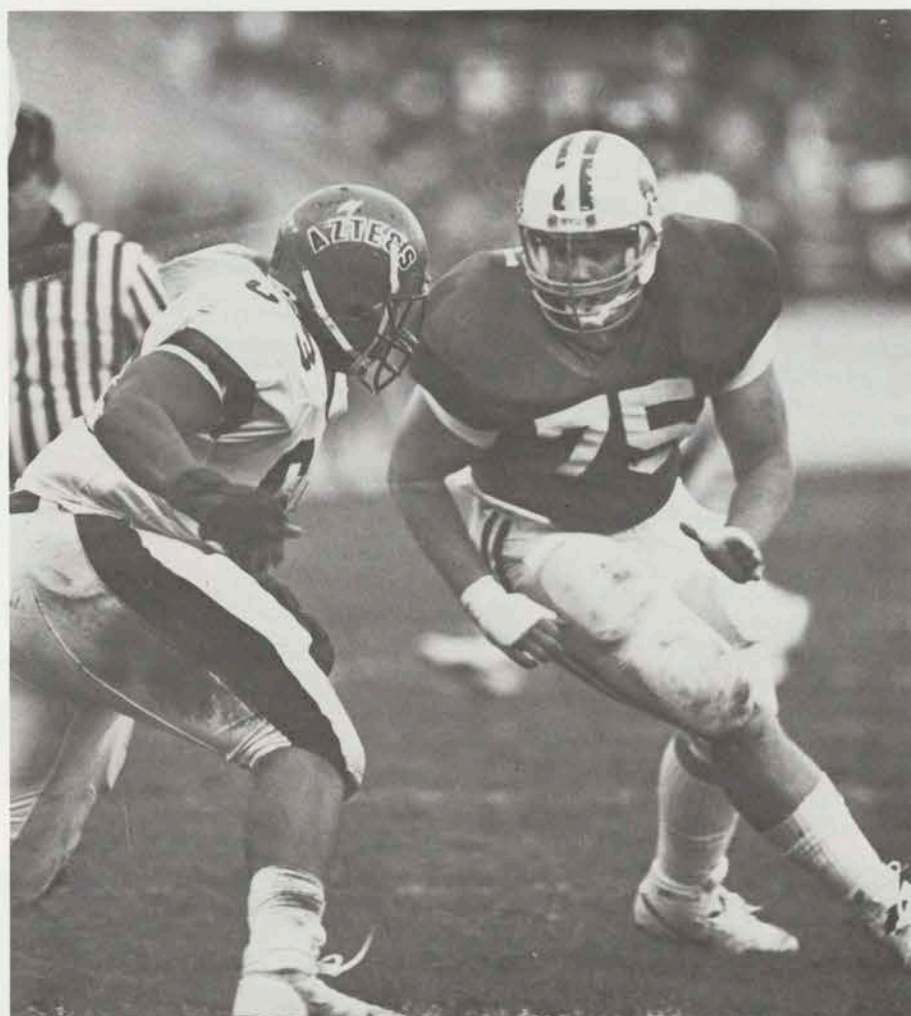
While the WAC race still could end in a four-way tie, the Holiday Bowl picture could be settled this afternoon in El Paso.

If Wyoming beats UTEP, the Cowboys will have at least a tie for the title and will get the host spot in San Diego by virtue of its win over the Cougars.

If Wyoming loses today, BYU could still win the title outright by winning its final two games and having Hawaii beat Wyoming next week.

Representatives of two bowl committees, the All-American and the Freedom, have been following the Cougars for the past month. If Wyoming wins today, BYU could have a bowl invitation before dark.

The All-American Bowl is Tuesday, Dec. 22, in Birmingham,

Alabama. The Freedom Bowl and Sea World Holiday Bowl are both on Wednesday, Dec. 30. All three bowl kick off at 6 p.m. Mountain Standard Time.

BYU enters today's game with a four-game winning streak while the Utes have dropped four of their last five. The Cougars have rebounded from losses in two of their first three starts while the Utes have had troubles after winning three of their first four.

Even with a losing record, Utah has led the nation in passing most of the year and been one of the top teams in punting and scoring. Quarterbacks Chris Mendonca and Scott Mitchell have been among the nation's leaders in passing efficiency.

Likewise, the combined stats of Bob Jensen and Sean Covey would place the BYU quarterback position among the national leaders. BYU has been in the top 10 in passing offense for most of the season.

BYU's defense also has played well for the last four weeks, shutting off Hawaii, Air Force, San Diego State and UTEP during the second half.

During that stretch, the Cougars have allowed only two touchdowns in the second half, both late in the fourth quarter after games had been decided.

Last week, the BYU defense limited John Harvey to 38 yards. He entered the game averaging nearly 119 yards, 13th best in the country.

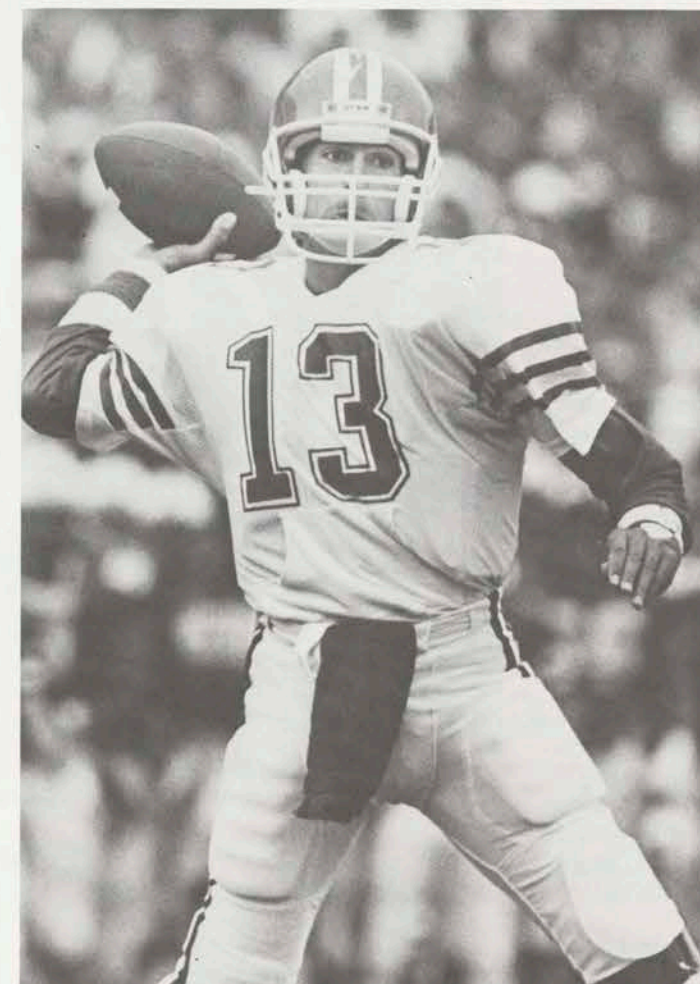

Series Notes

What was one of the most lopsided series in college football 20 years ago has started to even out. The Utes still command a whopping 39-19-4 lead, but the

Cougars have won eight in a row and 14 of the 15 games played between the schools since LaVell Edwards has been BYU's head coach.

The Cougars used to declare a "moral" victory if they stayed within a touchdown or two of the Utes in the early part of the rivalry. In 1938 BYU managed a tie, and they pulled off their first win in 1942. Utah built up a 38-5-4 lead in the series until 1972, at which time Coach Edwards started to swing the pendulum the other way. Last year, BYU jumped to a large lead and let the Utes climb back into the game in the last quarter.

Western Athletic Conference Update

Today is the final full Saturday for Western Athletic Conference football teams and three of the schools are bowl prospects.

One team is assured the host spot in the Sea World Holiday Bowl. Wyoming is the frontrunner with an unbeaten league record. The Cowboys can clinch the Holiday Bowl berth with a win at Texas-El Paso.

Air Force, tied with UTEP for third place, reportedly is in line for the Freedom Bowl in Anaheim. And BYU, the second-place team, is high on the list of candidates for the All-American Bowl.

UTEP, which is having its best season in two decades and can finish 8-3, apparently missed out on bowl consideration. The Sun Bowl, with its CBS affiliation, is looking at Southern California and Oklahoma State, which played Wyoming early in the season.

Fourth-place Hawaii had a week off and now must face Air Force, Wyoming and Arkansas in the next three games. Winless New Mexico tries again tonight at San Diego State and Colorado State, a winner only once, travels to Southwest Louisiana.

Besides Wyoming and Air Force, two other BYU opponents are in the running for bowl berths. Pittsburgh has fashioned a 7-3 record going into today's game with Kent State. The Panthers shut out Penn State, 10-0, last Saturday and are responsible for dealing Notre Dame its only loss. Pitt is expected to accept a Bluebonnet Bowl invitation.

Texas is 5-4 going into today's game with Baylor. The Longhorns have rebounded from a terrible start and currently find themselves tied for the lead in the Southwest Conference.

UT can go to the Cotton Bowl by winning its final two games. Some observers think a win over Baylor would assure the Longhorns of a spot in the Bluebonnet Bowl even if they lose to Texas A&M for the conference championship (and Cotton Bowl).

BYU's other two nonconference opponents also have bounced back from awful starts. Texas

Christian, which lost three of its first four, is now 5-5 with a chance to knock off A&M today.

Utah State, which lost its first five games, is now 4-6. The Aggies conclude their season today at Long Beach State.

Opponents of other WAC teams figure prominently in the bowl picture. Tennessee, which played Colorado State, is rumored for the Peach Bowl against Big Ten runner-up Indiana.

Texas Tech, also on the CSU schedule, has a shot at the Independence Bowl. Arizona State, a UTEP opponent, could

face Air Force in the Freedom Bowl.

Arkansas, which plays New Mexico next week and Hawaii in two weeks, looks good for the Liberty Bowl against Georgia. Notre Dame, which plays Air Force each year, is likely for the Cotton Bowl.

UCLA, which opened the season by beating San Diego State, can clinch a Rose Bowl berth with a win over Southern Cal this afternoon. A loss probably would send the Bruins to the Aloha Bowl.

BYU has been to nine straight bowl games and 11 in the past 13 years. The Cougars are 4-7, having lost last year to UCLA in Freedom Bowl III.

The Cougars lost to Oklahoma State in the Fiesta Bowl in 1974 and to Oklahoma State in the Tangerine Bowl (now Florida Citrus) in 1976.

In the first two Holiday Bowls, BYU lost close games to Navy and Indiana in 1978 and 1979.

In 1980 and 1981, the Cougars won close games over Southern Methodist and Washington State. Ohio State beat BYU in 1982 at the Holiday Bowl before the Cougars defeated Missouri and Michigan in 1983 and 1984.

Ohio State then edged BYU in the Florida Citrus Bowl in 1985.

WAC action concludes on Friday night, Dec. 4, when BYU meets Colorado State in Melbourne, Australia. The Cougars and Rams originally were scheduled to play in Fort Collins on Oct. 17 but switched the game when the WAC accepted a proposal from the Melbourne Gridiron Bowl.

KUTV, Channel 2 in Salt Lake City, will televise the game in the Salt Lake City and Denver areas, beginning at 8 p.m.

Should the All-American Bowl offer materialize for BYU, it would be the Cougars' first football game in Alabama. The game is scheduled for Tuesday night, Dec. 22, at 70,000-seat Legion Field in Birmingham.

Kickoff time is 8 p.m. EST, or 6 p.m. in Utah.

BYU has played three basketball games in Alabama but is not scheduled to go to Alabama for football until 1996--the second half of a home-and-home series with the Crimson Tide.

The Cougars played basketball at Alabama in 1957 and against Alabama-Birmingham in 1983. They also were in Birmingham in March of this year to play New Orleans in the NCAA Tournament.

The All-American Bowl payout of \$800,000 per team (or conference, in BYU's case) is higher than the California, Independence, Aloha, Freedom, Holiday and Bluebonnet Bowls and equal to the Sun, Hall of Fame and Peach Bowls.

LaVell Edwards

LaVell Edwards took over a program in 1972 which had averaged less than three wins a year in the school's 47 football seasons. The Cougars could claim only one Western Athletic Conference championship (1965) and had never been to a bowl game.

Since that time, however, BYU has won 137 games, 11 WAC championships (including 10 in a row before last year) and with last year's Freedom Bowl, has played in 11 bowl games. Honors and recognition have rolled in as the football program has risen to national prominence.

Five times in his 15 years as head coach ('72, '79, '80, '83 and '84), the 56-year-old Edwards has been selected WAC Coach-of-the-Year, and five times he has been named Kodak District Eight Coach-of-the-Year ('74, '77, '79, '80 and '84). The post-season

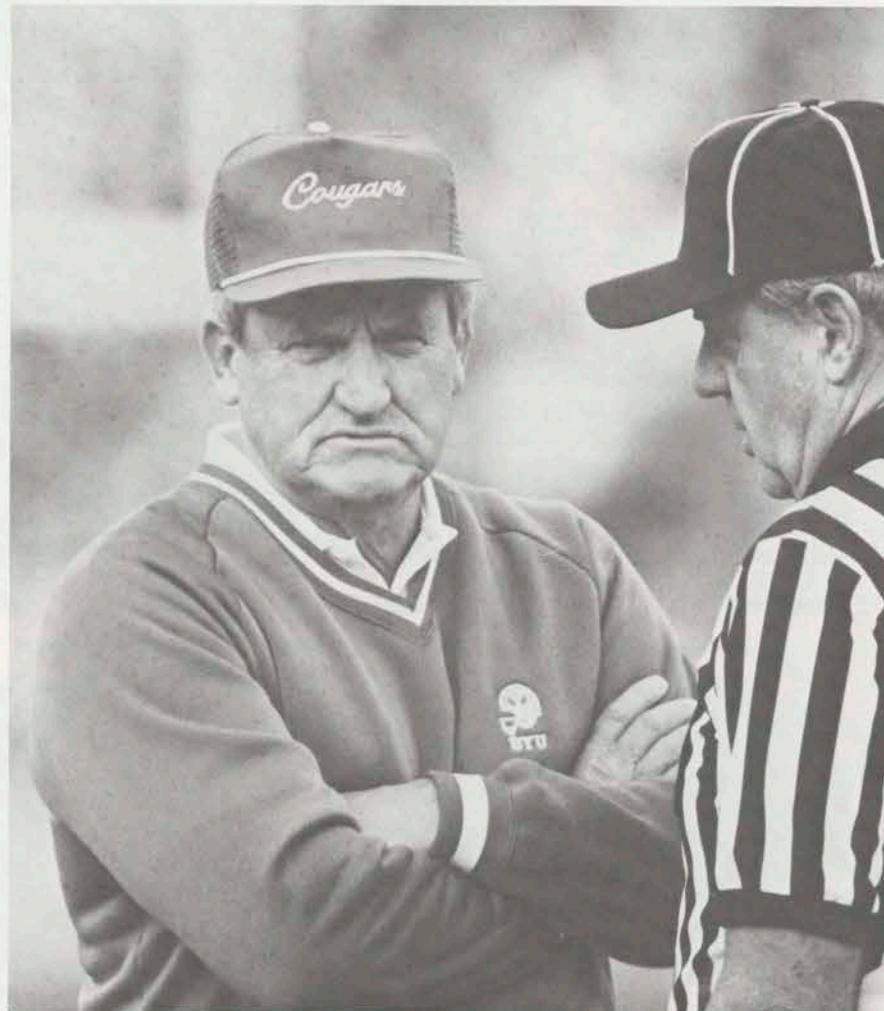
games that LaVell has coached in include the Hula Bowl (twice), the Blue-Gray Classic (twice), the East-West Shrine game (three times), the Japan Bowl (twice) and the Coaches' All-America Game.

This year, LaVell is serving as president of the 5,700-member American Football Coaches Association (AFCA).

In 1984, Edwards led the Cougars to their first-ever football national championship and along the way, picked up NCAA Coach-of-the-Year honors from the

American Football Coaches, the Football Writers and the Pigskin Club of Washington, D.C.

LaVell's winning percentage (.753) ranks fifth among the nation's active college coaches. And under Edwards, BYU has

averaged over 10 wins a season in the 1980's. Last season, LaVell passed Frank Kush as the all-time leader in WAC coaching victories.

Having roots in nearby Orem, Utah, LaVell was born and raised not far from BYU's stadium. He graduated from Lincoln High School in Orem and attended Utah State in Logan, where he was a three-year letterman and captain of the football team. Twice he earned all-conference honors at center for the Aggies.

At USU he met his wife-to-be.

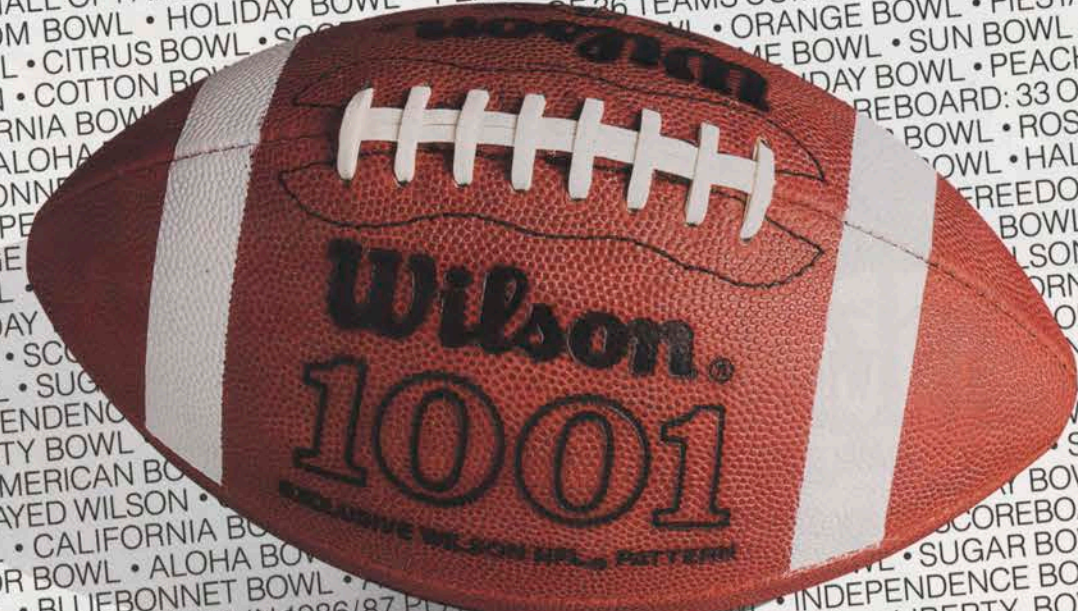
Patti Covey. LaVell entered the Army, where he played on two service football teams: Fort Lee, Va., in 1952 and Fort Mead, Md., in 1953 as a player-coach with a 6-3 record.

From there, LaVell went into his first full-time coaching job at Granite High School in Salt Lake City, where he coached from 1954-61 before joining Hal Mitchell's BYU staff in 1962. Ten years after becoming part of the Cougar staff, Edwards was named head coach Tommy Hudspeth's successor.

The football philosophy practiced by Coach Edwards is one of high-powered offense and rugged defense. Under his guidance, BYU has led the nation in passing eight times ('76, '77, '79, '80, '81, '83, '84 and '85), in total offense five times ('79, '80, '83, '84 and '85) and in scoring ('79).

A 1952 graduate of Utah State, Edwards has added to his academic honors a master's degree from the University of Utah (1960) and an Ed.D. from BYU (1978). His attitude toward education is contagious, and several of his assistants have gone on to attain doctorate degrees.

He and Patti have three married children: Ann Edwards Cannon, a writer; John, a former member of the BYU track team; and Jim, a former wide receiver for the Cougars.

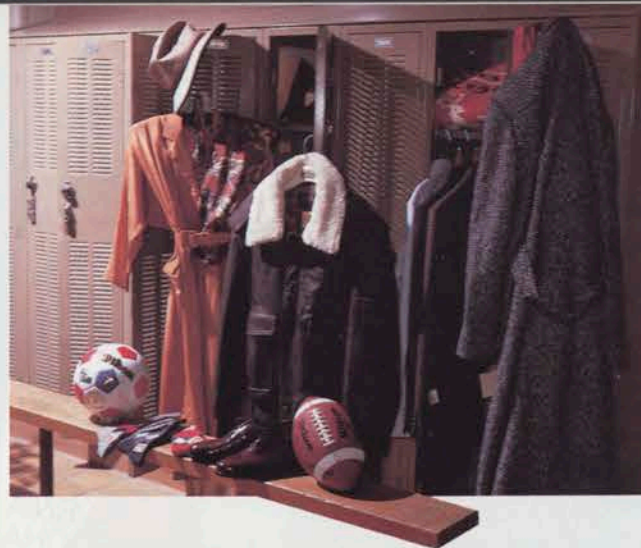

Claude Bassett (BYU '78) Inside Linebackers

Claude Bassett is in his fifth year with the Cougar football program. He was named an assistant coach in 1985 after working as a graduate assistant with the Cougars for two years.

Prior to coming to BYU for graduate work, Bassett was a coach and teacher at Mountain View High School in Mesa, Ariz. There he worked under Coach Jess Parker and helped the team win the state title twice. He also taught and coached at Pleasant Grove High (1976) and Spanish Fork High (1978) in Utah County.

Born in Reno, Nev., Bassett attended Enterprise High School in Redding, Calif., where he participated in football and baseball. He also attended Shasta Junior College in Redding.

Before transferring to BYU, he served a two-year mission for the LDS Church in Rome, Italy.

Norm Chow (Utah '68) Quarterbacks and Receivers

Norm Chow has been an integral part of BYU's successful offense for

the past 12 seasons. He coaches the receivers and the quarterbacks and is the coach who calls BYU's plays from the press box. For several years, Chow coordinated BYU's recruiting efforts.

Previous to joining the BYU coaching staff full time, Chow coached for two years as a graduate assistant. He graduated from Punahou High, Honolulu, Haw., ('64) being named "Athlete of the Year." He then attended the University of Utah, where he achieved All-WAC (1967-68) and honorable mention All-America honors as an offensive guard. A career in the Canadian Football League was cut short after one year when Chow injured his knee. He then became head coach for three years at Hawaii's Waialua High School.

Chow received a master's degree in special education from the University of Utah and a doctorate in educational psychology from BYU in 1979.

Dick Felt (BYU '58) Asst. Head Coach, Def. Coord.

After an outstanding college career at BYU and a seven-year stint in

professional football, Dick Felt returned to his alma mater in 1967 to become a coach.

Dick lettered in five sports at Lehi High School in Utah and was an all-state football player. He went to BYU where, as a sophomore, he came off the bench in a game with San Jose State to score a record four touchdowns in one quarter. He won all-conference honors as a senior. After graduating in 1958, he played for Bolling Air Force Base (1958-60), where he earned all-service honors and was named MVP in the Air Force (1960).

Felt played two seasons with the New York Titans (1960-61), the second year attaining all-pro second-team honors as a defensive back. He was traded to the Boston Patriots and was all-pro in 1962. He played in the first two AFL all-star games.

Roger French (Minnesota '56) Offensive Coordinator, Off. Line

Roger French has been in charge of BYU's offense for the past seven years, during which time the Cougars have traditionally led the nation in passing and total offense. French has

helped produce numerous All-WAC and All-America offensive linemen.

Before coming to BYU, Roger coached at Minnesota and Wisconsin for 14 years. His responsibilities as Minnesota included coaching the offensive line, tight ends and receivers. He was also defensive coordinator and line coach at Wisconsin and Memphis State. Since French has come to BYU, the Cougars have won the National Championship (1984) and set the NCAA total offense record of 584 yards per game (1983). They also led the nation in passing and total offense three of the last four years.

Born in Minneapolis, French played linebacker, tight end and fullback Minnesota, graduating in 1956. He obtained a master's degree and played some pro ball with the Philadelphia Eagles and the Cleveland Browns. He began coaching at Memphis State, where he was defensive coordinator. In 1962, MSU finished second in the nation defensively. He has coached several All-American linemen in his career, and more than 35 have gone on to play pro ball.

Mel Olson (BYU '70) **Academic Coord., Offensive Line**

Mel Olson left his mark as a center playing for BYU in the '60s before joining the BYU coaching ranks 18 years ago. He works with the offensive line but mainly concentrates on the centers. He worked closely with Trevor Matich and Bart Oates, former BYU centers who now play in the NFL. He also serves the team as academic coordinator. While coaching the jayvees several years ago, his teams were undefeated three times.

Born in Afton, Wyo., Mel was an all-state fullback and linebacker at Star Valley High for two years (1962-63). He was a member of BYU's first WAC championship team (1965) before accepting a mission call to Texas (1967-69). Returning to BYU he earned All-WAC and All-America honors his senior year. He was voted to the second team on the 15-year All-WAC football team.

Mel earned his Ed.D. at BYU in 1980, majoring in physical education and minoring in health education.

Chris Pella (Utah State '66) **Recruiting Coord., Kicking**

Chris Pella joined the BYU coaching fraternity last year after spending 18 years as a coach at Utah State. He was head coach of the Aggies from 1983-85. Pella is responsible for coaching the kickers, the tight ends and coordinating BYU's recruiting efforts.

A native of Brigham City, Utah, Pella attended Box Elder High School and Dixie Junior College, where he was team captain and a junior college All-American. He then joined the Utah State Aggies as a fullback, offensive lineman and kicker. He set a school record with nine PATs in a game vs. New Mexico State.

After graduating in 1965, Pella was hired as an assistant coach, a position he held for 15 years under coaches Tony Knap, Chuck Mills, Phil Krueger and Bruce Snyder. Over that time, he worked with every position on the team. He also was head wrestling coach for two years. Pella worked for the U.S. Navy in Yokosuka, Japan, as the athletic director and football coach at the Navy base from 1969 to 1972.

His 1971 team won the Interservice Championship and played in the Rice Bowl. He returned to Utah State in the fall of 1972. In 1983 he was named head football coach, replacing Bruce Snyder.

Tom Ramage (Utah State '57) **Defensive Line, Special Teams**

Tom Ramage joined the BYU staff 15 years ago after coaching in the high school, junior college and major college ranks. Since Ramage was hired, the Cougars have traditionally ranked high in the WAC in defense against the rush.

Tom came to BYU from Dixie College in St. George, Utah, where he was head coach for two seasons (13-7 overall). He was born in Price, Utah, and enrolled at Utah State, where he won All-Skyline Conference and All-America honors as a tackle in 1956 and lettered in wrestling four years.

He began his coaching career at Bear River, Utah, then returned to USU, where he served as assistant and obtained his M.S. degree (1962). For the next four years, Tom was line coach of the Aggies.

He left Logan in 1965 to serve as chief assistant and defensive coordinator at Weber State under Sark Arslanian. In 1971 he took the head job at Dixie College. Sandwiched into his stay at Weber, he served as a commissioned officer in the Army and was discharged as a captain in 1967. Tom has coached two Outland Trophy winners: Merlin Olsen (Utah State) and Jason Buck (BYU).

Lance Reynolds (BYU '77) **Running Backs**

During the past decade, Lance Reynolds has played a key role in BYU's football successes as a player and as a coach. He joined the BYU staff in 1983 after successful coaching jobs at Ricks College (Rexburg, Ida.) and Snow College (Ephraim, Utah). He was offensive coordinator at Ricks.

A Salt Lake native, Lance was all-state at Granite High School. He played offensive tackle and guard at BYU before leaving on an LDS mission to Seattle, Wash., after his sophomore year. When he returned, he earned All-WAC honors at offensive tackle and played in the East-West Shrine game and the Senior Bowl. He played one season with both the Pittsburgh Steelers and Philadelphia Eagles.

Ken Schmidt (Utah '64) **Outside Linebackers**

Ken Schmidt's name is well recognized in Utah coaching circles. He joined the Cougars in 1982 after a successful high school and junior college coaching career.

A Murray, Utah, native, Schmidt enrolled in the University of Utah, where he was a center and linebacker under Coach Ray Nagel. He was graduated in 1964 and obtained his M.S. degree from Utah in 1969. He began his coaching career as an assistant at Granger High School (1964-68).

Later, he was named head coach at Skyline High School (Salt Lake City), where his teams posted a 105-24-1 record and won five state championships during his stay (1968-79). In 1980, he was named head coach at Ricks College (Rexburg, Ida.). The Vikings won the conference championship both his years there and posted a 17-3 record. In 1981, Ricks defeated Arizona Western in the Valley of the Sun Bowl.



Graduate Assistants

The junior varsity program offers challenges because many freshmen and sophomore players spend the week working out with the varsity, dealing with their position coaches and helping run the offenses and defenses of the varsity opponent.

Often, the roster for junior varsity games is not determined until a day or two before the game. Obviously, junior varsity players don't have much time to work out as a combined unit, much less to work on opponents' plays.

Helping the varsity prepare also is the name of the game for BYU's seven graduate assistants, men getting additional schooling before returning to the high school ranks or pursuing fulltime collegiate jobs.

For the year the head coach is George Bayles, a native of Blanding, Utah, who was a lineman at Dixie College and Cal State-Los Angeles. Bayles has been a high

school coach in California and Utah—nine years at his alma mater, San Juan in Blanding, and three at Mountain Crest in Hyrum.

Bayles obtained a masters degree from BYU in 1983 and is in his second year as the BYU JV coach. He specializes with the defensive line.

The offensive coordinator is Zane Zamenski, originally from Townsend, Massachusetts. He played quarterback at Ricks College and Holy Cross. He was a volunteer at BYU under former quarterback coach Mike Holmgren and then coached at Ricks and the College of Eastern Utah.

Assisting with the offense are Craig Garrick (line) and Tommy Tuipulotu (backs). Garrick played at Provo High and on BYU's national championship team in 1984 while Tuipulotu has to forego his final year of eligibility because of a knee injury. The Tongan, who played at

San Mateo High in California, was the leading J.V. rusher in 1983 and led BYU in yards per carry in 1985.

The defensive coordinator is Bobby Salazar, in his second year as an assistant. He transferred to BYU after playing at Santa Rosa Junior College in California and participating in spring ball at Southern California. His final year as a defensive back for the Cougars was 1983.

Working with the linebackers is Don Allen, from Carlsbad, Calif., who played at Southern Utah State. Allen was the receiver coach at Carlsbad High last year but has helped with BYU summer camps.

In his second year as a graduate assistant is John Coatta, who will work with the varsity quarterbacks. The Minneapolis native played that position at Minnesota as a freshman and then at Catawba College in North Carolina. He also was a graduate assistant at Florida State.

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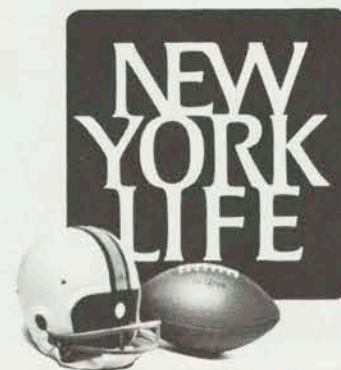
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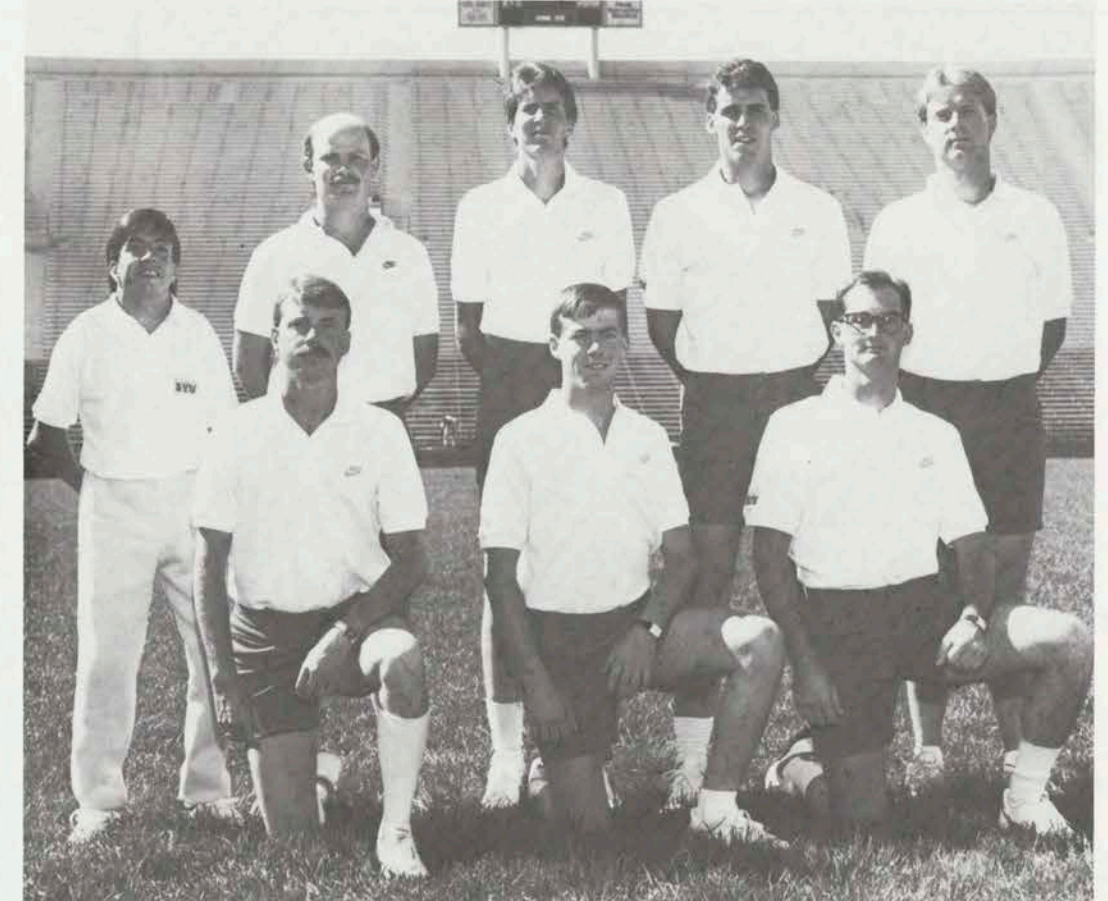

Cougar Stadium

General Information

Cougar Stadium is one of the finest football facilities in the country. Following are a few facts about the stadium.

Seating Capacity: The stadium seats close to 65,000 spectators. There are 16,618 seats in the North stands, 16,661 in the South stands, 16,719 in the East and 14,930 in the West.

Largest Crowd: Cougar Stadium was sold out every game during its first four years. The single-game attendance record is 65,508, set in 1984 against Utah State.

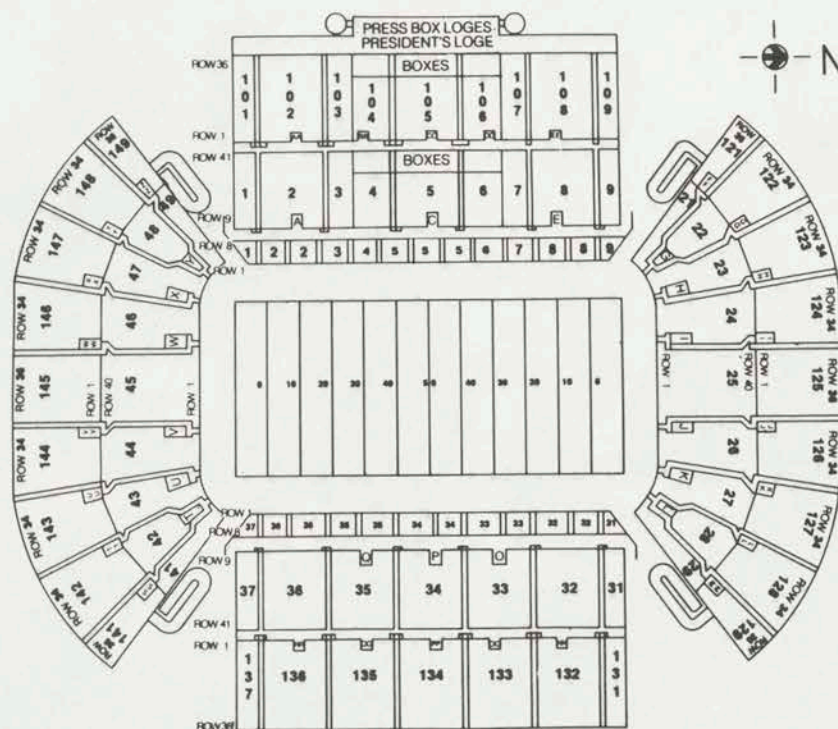
Press Box: The impressive press box facility, situated on the West stands, is 10 stories high. It comprises four levels and runs the entire length of the field. The first two levels are made up of loges—glass enclosed booths capable of seating up to 12 people. Each loge has a TV, radio, refrigerator, sink and telephone hookup. There are 42 loges.

The President's Box is located on the first level and provides seating for over 160 people. The third level is for working press and can accommodate about 250 people. Television cameras are located on the fourth level. Situated inside two concrete towers are three elevators and a stairway that provide access to the press box.

Cougar Club Room: Located under the south end of the west stands, the Cougar Club Room is home of BYU's Athletic Hall of Fame. On game days, Cougar Club members can attend a pre-game briefing in the room, which can normally seat about 250 at tables but can be expanded to seat up to 440. The room is equipped with a good sound system, a video playback unit and several TV monitors.

The room is also home of the Utah County Chapter of Cougar Club and is used for hosting recruits, for team socials and for Cougar Club Board of Directors meetings.

President's Reception Area: Adjacent to the Cougar Club Room is the President's Reception Room. It is used to host special guests of the University.



Playing Surface: The natural grass playing surface has a sand base, which is capable of draining up to 13 inches of rainfall per hour.

Stadium Policies

First Aid/Police: Stations are located under the West stands.

Duplicate Tickets: The University cannot assume responsibility for tickets left at home, lost or stolen. However, duplicate tickets may be issued to the ticket patron or spouse if the seat location is on file at the Ticket Office. The charge for this service is \$3.00 per ticket.

Activity Cards: BYU faculty, staff and student tickets should be accompanied by a current activity card. Faculty, staff and student tickets are non-transferable to the public unless accompanied by a guest pass.

Wheelchairs: Wheelchairs must be located in designated wheelchair areas. Wheelchair tickets are non-transferable to other patrons.

Coolers and Baby Strollers: Coolers and strollers will not be allowed inside the stadium.

Glass Bottles: No glass bottles will be allowed in the stadium.

Umbrellas: As a courtesy to others, the use of umbrellas is discouraged.

Children: Every person two years of age and older must have a ticket.

Radios: If you bring a radio, please be considerate of those around you and try to use earphones.

Game Programs: The "Cougar Illustrated" game program is available at several locations inside the stadium as well as numerous locations outside the stadium. Cost is \$1.00.

Signs: Signs, banners, pictures, etc., that are offensive to individuals and teams, that are not in good taste or that create a safety hazard will **not** be allowed. The hanging or displaying of signs on any part of the stadium is prohibited as a safety precaution, to eliminate excessive cleanup and to avoid defacing of property with tape, glue, nails or other materials.

Standing: No standing will be permitted on concourses or at portal entries.

Phones: Are located under the west stands and under the second level of the east stands.

That tradition combines the Cougar and Ute Bands for two musical numbers at the end of the halftime to salute America's Bicentennial celebration of the Constitution.

The tradition started five years ago when directors of the two fine bands decided to do something to cement better relations between the schools.

Results of the dual performances drew positive response from fans, administrators and band members alike.

That tradition continues today in Cougar Stadium.

For the first part of the halftime show, the Ute Marching Band--under the direction of Rick

Clary--will play a fast-paced rendition of "Strike Up the Band"

followed by "Jericho," which features 36 dancers.

Clary said the band has new uniforms, thanks to a donor from Salt Lake City. The band includes 74 instrumentalists, 30 percussionists and 36 dancers.

After the Ute Band leaves the field, the Cougar Band will come on to play "I've Got Rhythm," with dancing performed by the Cougarettes.

Next will be the popular "Send in the Clowns," featuring a colorful parachute in the middle of the formation during the finale.

The Ute Band will then return to the field and mix with the Cougar Band for a colorful striping of the field in "red, white and blue" with 385 performers.

The bands will combine to pay tribute to the Bicentennial of the Constitution by playing "God Bless America" (Irving Berlin's famous patriotic song) and the popular "Stars and Stripes Forever" by John Philip Sousa.

The latter tune features the trumpets and piccolos. This arrangement by Raymond J. Baumgardt ends with a majestic restatement of the theme.

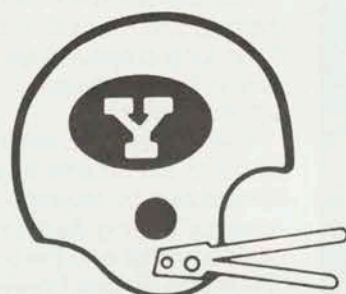

But as Shakespeare said, "A rose by any other name would smell as sweet." Call her anything you like, this player is dynamite on the court.

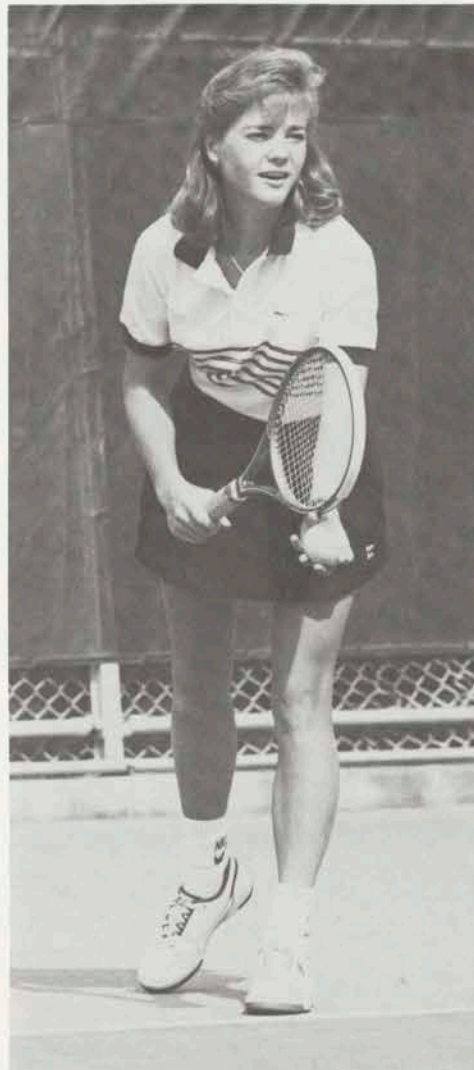

At BYU, Sydney has competed against many of the country's top players. Her favorite match was against Trinity last winter.

"We had lots of crowd support. Everyone was pulling for us, and we nearly all played flawless tennis," she says. "We swept the singles 5-1. This shows what a supportive crowd can do. It was an incredible experience."

Sydney, who uses a Head graphite pro racquet, feels that her quickness on the court is her greatest asset. "I do a lot of footwork drills, such as running stairs and hills with the team to help increase my speed."

As a child, Sydney was interested in many sports, but her parents steered her towards tennis because they felt it was more

feminine and offered a better chance for scholarships.

"I was eight years old the first time I picked up a racquet, but I didn't start taking lessons or playing year round until I was 13," she says.

There were no professional tennis instructors in La Grange, so Sydney commuted for lessons. Later, during her high school years, she attended a boarding school in Memphis, Tenn., so that she could continue playing tennis.

"It was during this time that I gained a lot of independence and discipline," says Sydney. "I was sent to tournaments all over the country when I was 15 and 16 years old. I was forced to be outgoing. I was an unknown from a small town, and I would get

intimidated by the girls I would play against until I got to know them. Then I realized they were just like me."

Sydney was 17 when she met BYU assistant coach Keith Nielson, who would later give her the name Peaches.

"Keith saw me at the National 18-and-under Indoor Tournament in Kansas City, and recruited me my senior year," she says.

"When I visited Provo, I was really impressed by the beauty of BYU and of the mountains. We don't have mountains like this in Georgia."

Sydney has played tennis at BYU for the past three years, but is especially excited about this year, her final season.

"This year we are all getting along so well. Everyone is behind each other one hundred percent. That's what makes a winning team," she says. (BYU is ranked No. 10 in the nation in the pre-season.) "We all work hard and have positive attitudes."

Sydney works hard in other areas of her life as well. An advertising major, she looks forward to graduation in April 1988.

"I love my major. Everytime I do a campaign, it's like playing a tennis match. I'm putting my creativity and talent on the line."

"I'm not sure what I want to do with tennis after graduation, but I know that the skills and qualities that I have learned through playing tennis will help me in my career and throughout my life," Sydney adds.

Whether she puts her talents to work on the tennis courts or in the advertising world, Sydney is sure to make her mark.

After all, who can resist Peaches from Georgia?

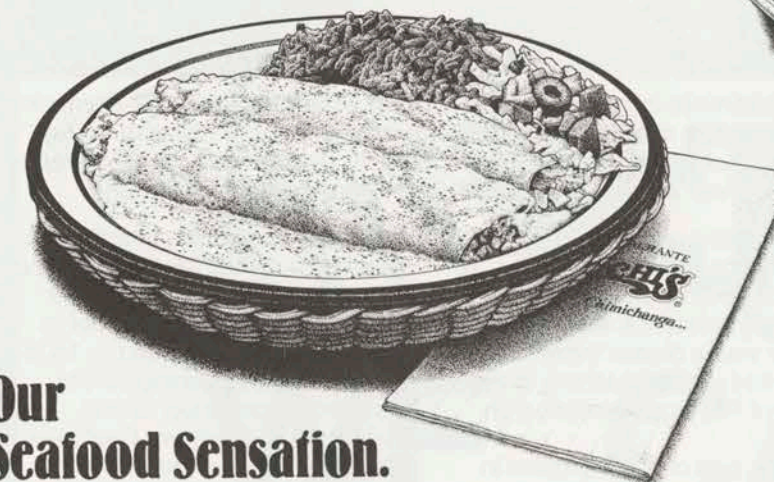
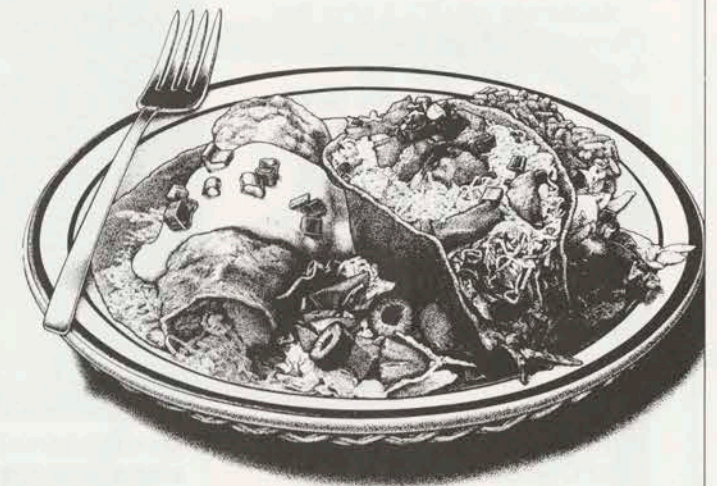

New Coach: Mako Sakamoto

Makoto Sakamoto would like to hear people talk about BYU and United States' gymnastics in the same breath.

Sakamoto is the new BYU men's gymnastics coach and speaks from experience when he talks of nationally and internationally recognized gymnastics programs. He was the assistant coach at UCLA when three (that's right--three) gymnasts represented the Bruins at the 1984 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles. Tim Daggett, Mitch Gaylord and gold medal winner Peter Vidmar were all members of an outstanding UCLA gymnastics team.

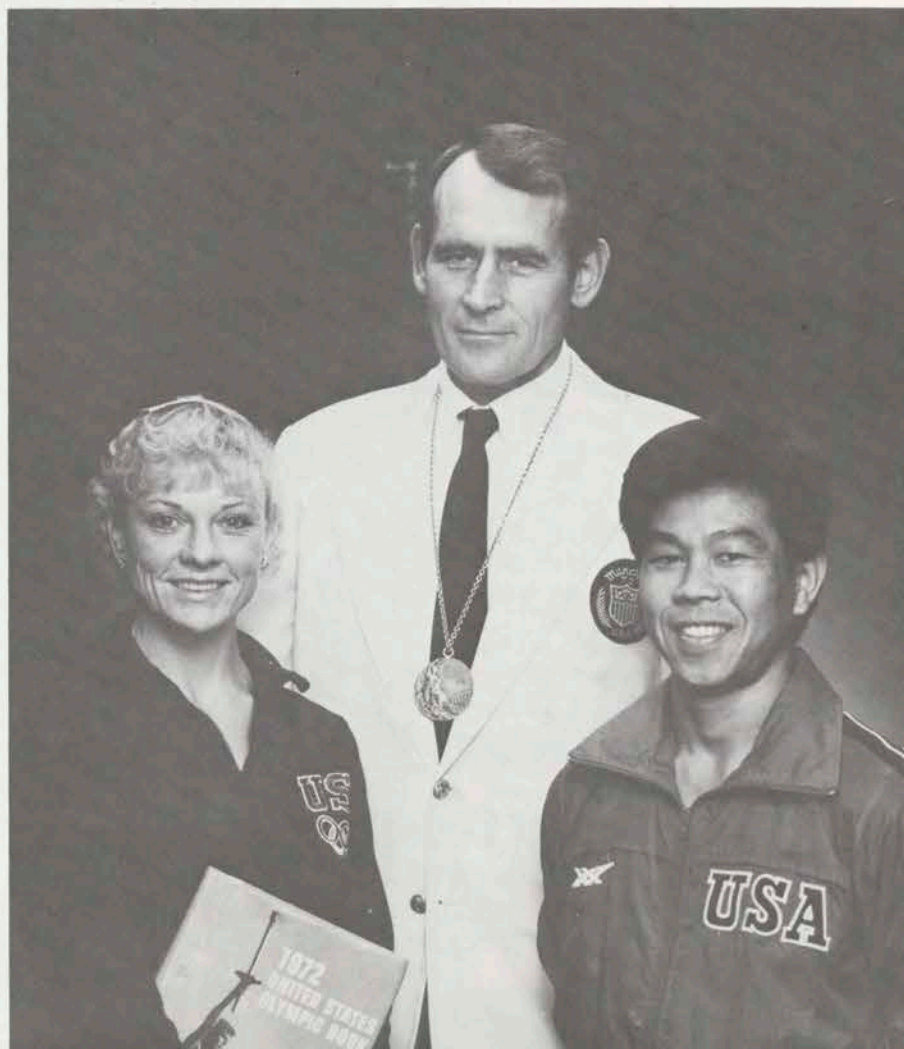
Sakamoto left UCLA after the Olympics and was living in Australia, working as the gymnastics coach for the New South Wales Australia Gymnastics Association, when a call from BYU Athletic Director Glen Tuckett asked him to look into the possibility of coaching in Provo. He made a visit and was impressed by BYU's commitment to excellence.

"I would like to repeat what UCLA did in 1984," says Sakamoto. "I would like to send as many gymnasts as I can to the 1992 Olympics in Barcelona, Spain."

Sakamoto is no stranger to Olympic competition. In 1984, he was the assistant gymnastics coach for the U.S. Olympic team. That team, due in a large part to Sakamoto's UCLA trio, won the gold medal in Los Angeles. In 1980, Sakamoto prepared Vidmar to make the Olympic team. Yet Vidmar was unable to compete because of the U.S. boycott of the Moscow Olympics.

As a competitor he represented the United States in the 1964 Olympics in Tokyo and the 1972 Olympics in Munich, Germany.

Along with Sakamoto, two other athletes that competed for the United States in the '72 Olympics are now closely associated with BYU. Debbie Hill was a member

of the women's gymnastics team and is now co-coach (with her husband, Rod) of the BYU women's gymnastics team. L. Jay Silvester was a discus thrower in Munich and is now teaching in the College of Physical Education on campus.

Being a part of the Olympics in Tokyo was a special experience for Sakamoto. "Tokyo was the best Olympics. They always say the first one is the best."

Besides just being his first Olympics, Sakamoto was born and lived in Japan for seven years. His father, a USC graduate, then moved the family from Tokyo to Los Angeles to

relocate his dentistry practice. Sakamoto's wife, Masako, is also from Tokyo. They met in 1969 while he was going to school in Tokyo and were married in 1975.

Prior to his coaching career, Sakamoto competed for the University of Southern California. Sakamoto is a well known name associated with gymnastics in Southern California. Makoto had two brothers, Mikio and Isamu, who also competed in gymnastics at USC and a third brother, Tadashi, who was a gymnastics champion at UCLA.

While he was competing in the 60's and 70's, Sakamoto was a seven-time U.S. all-around

champion. He won four titles in two years in NCAA competition. His first title came on the parallel bars in 1967. The next year he won the all-around title along with horizontal bar and parallel bar titles. His highest world ranking came in 1970 when he was ranked 12th.

Sakamoto said his overall objective as a coach at BYU is "to make BYU a center for developing international caliber gymnasts." That means the Olympic team and the world championships.

His second objective is "to put BYU on the map at the international and national levels." He wants "to have people associate BYU and USA" when the subject of gymnastics is discussed.

What does Sakamoto think will bring this success to BYU? His philosophy is based on hard work. He believes in putting "in an incredible number of intense hours but not forcing the kids to do it--doing it for sheer enjoyment, an enjoyment that is more intrinsic than extrinsic."

The satisfaction Sakamoto finds in coaching comes from "working with the kids. I like the process of just working and communicating with them and creating new challenges for them."

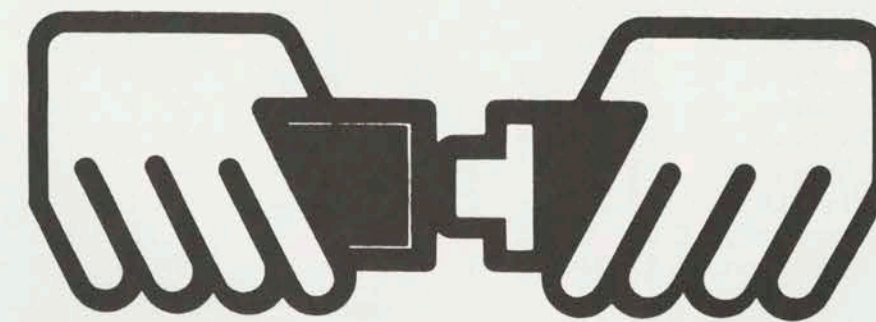
Sakamoto did not arrive in Provo to assume his coaching responsibilities until last month, which gave him a late start on the coming gymnastics season. He said one of the most important things to establish this year is "a

positive attitude towards training. By developing a positive attitude, great things will come to BYU." Family is important to Sakamoto. "My main thing is my family. I like to see my kids grow up healthy."

Besides family, Sakamoto also reveals a love for nature programs on television. The Cosby Show and Family Ties may be favorites in other homes, but The Wild Kingdom and National Geographic specials get top billing in the Sakamoto household.

Somehow, the combination of nature programs on TV, hard work in the gym and a great deal of experience are going to spell success for Sakamoto and BYU, or is that USA?

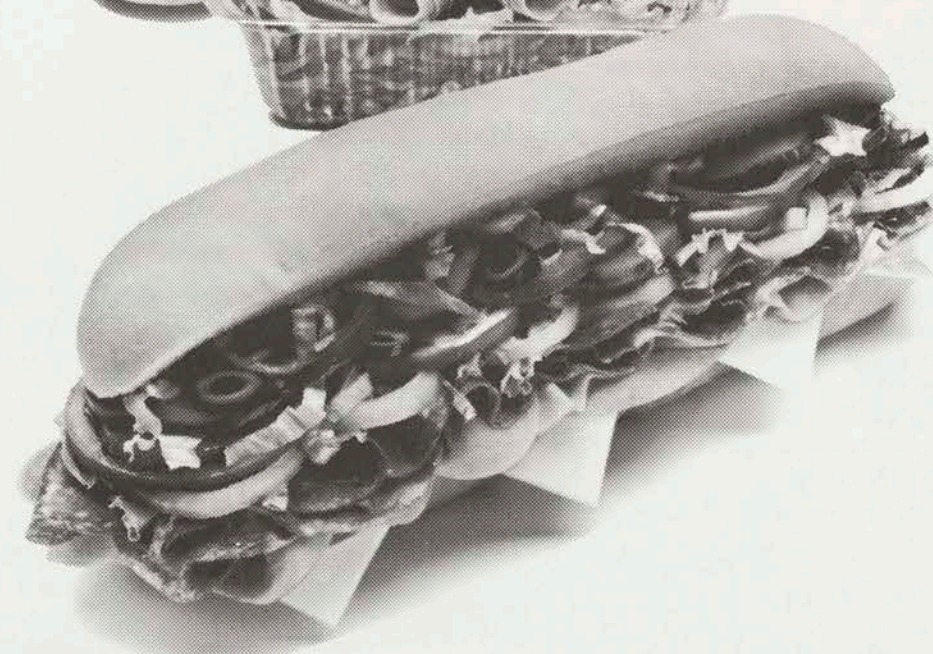

 cogs in the Ram offense. In all,
 17 starters graduated, leaving
 several big holes to fill.

Leading the Rams this season
 is offensive tackle Doug Fiala and
 second team All-WAC safety Ron
 Cortell.

Strengths are at the wide outs,
 the offensive line and the
 linebackers. Three of the top
 receivers, Todd Tyrell, J.D.
 Brookhart and Sanjay Beach,
 return to provide ample depth at
 wide receiver.

Scott Whitehouse was the
 number three rusher on the squad
 last season with only five carries
 but has emerged into one of the
 league's best runners.

Defensively, the Rams have
 experience at the ends with
 seniors Clint Hjelm and Doug
 Wills. Also, linebackers Don

Series Notes

Few matchups in college
 football have been as even as the
 BYU-CSU series. With the Rams'
 24-20 come-from-behind victory
 over BYU last year, the series
 became deadlocked at 23-23-3.

Actually, the Cougars have
 dominated in recent years. In
 LaVell Edwards' 15 seasons as
 head coach, the Cougars own an
 11-3-1 record against the Rams.

Last season's BYU loss to CSU
 was the first in a decade. The
 teams have met 18 times since
 CSU joined the WAC in 1967.
 BYU owns a 13-4-1 lead during
 that time. The series dates back to
 1922, when BYU first began
 keeping records of its
 intercollegiate football program.

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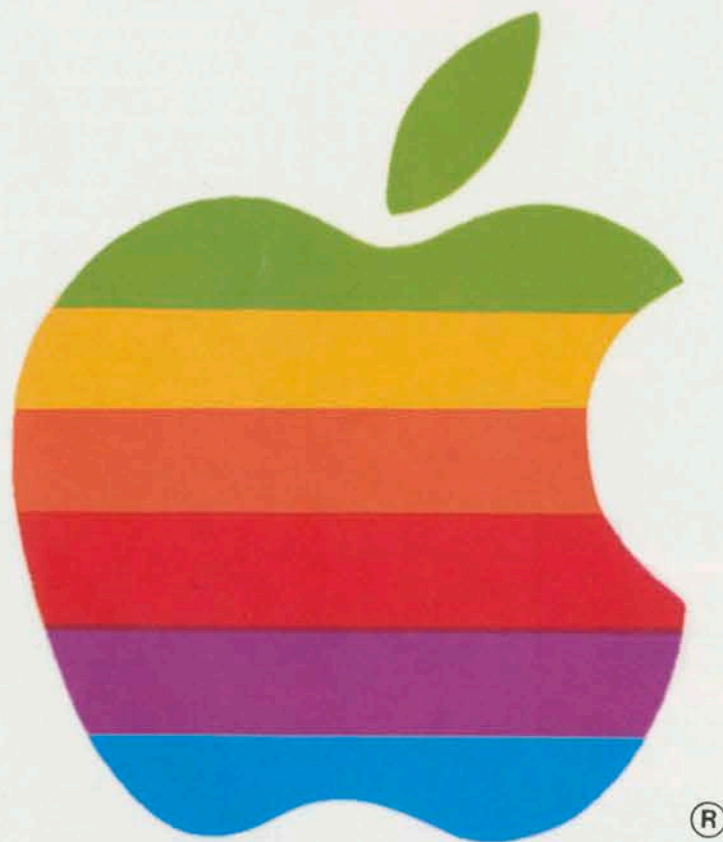
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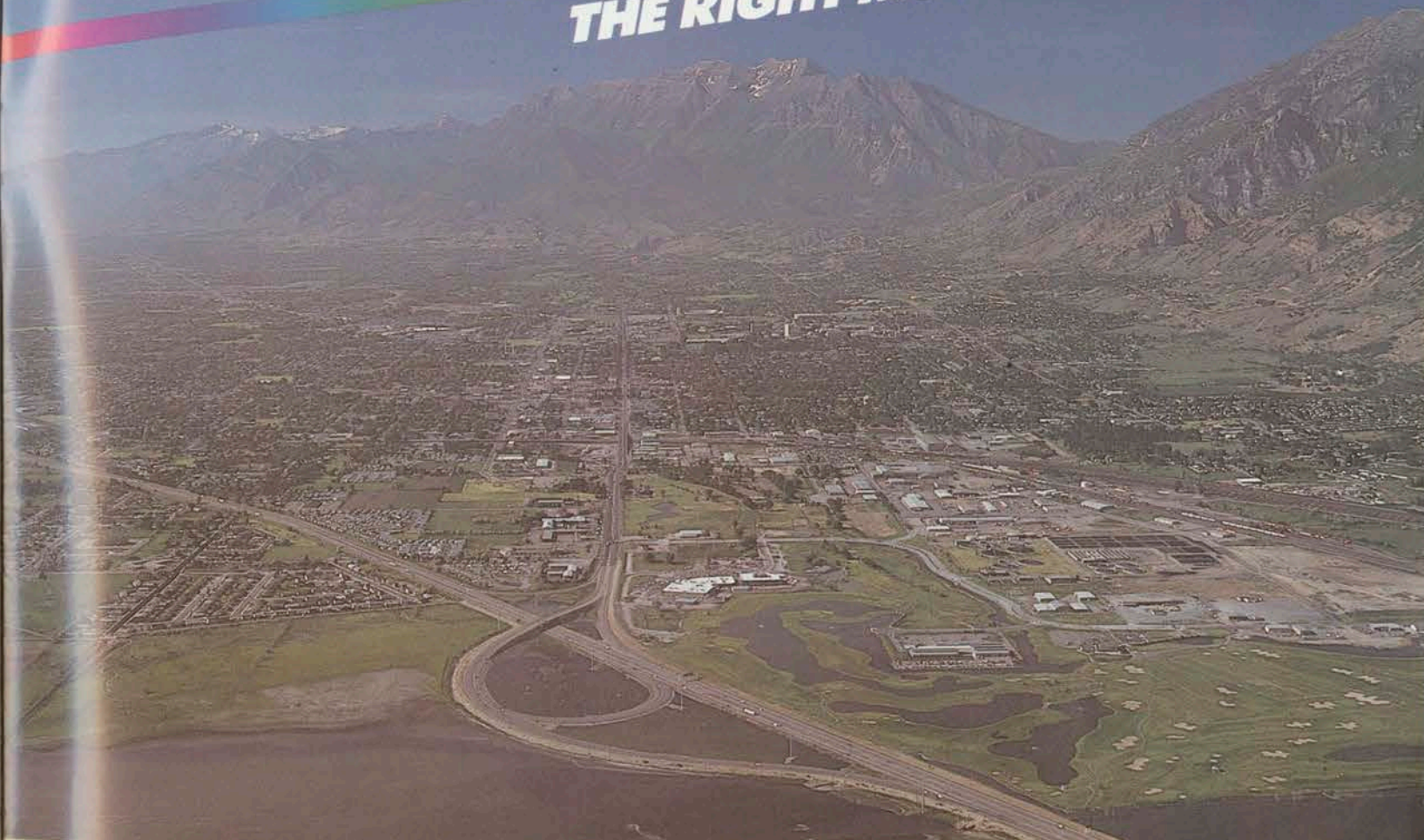
