120 km. or 80 miles. Crefeld, the home of the thirteen families who arrived in Philadelphia on the ship Concordia 6 October 1683, first settlers in Germantown, lies on the edge of the area, just west of the Rhine and north of Düsseldorf.

The Upper Palatinate lay on both sides of the Rhine, extending from Bingen and Mainz south to Karlsruhe, a distance of 120 km. or 80 miles. Its greatest width from a point east of Heidelberg to Kaiserslautern in the west was 130 km. or 85 miles.

By the year 1700 the word "Palatine" had been down-graded: no longer was it to represent a titled person; henceforth it represented a subject of the Palatinate who was eager to leave a land that had been devastated by the soldiers of Louis XIV when in 1688 they destroyed Heidelberg, Mannheim, and Speyer. Fortunately for the Palatine. the Rhine-that ancient route of travel-lay invitingly near. He took advantage of it to reach the Atlantic and embark for " the new land, Pennsylvania."

The accompanying maps show portions of present-day West Germany. The hatching on them supplied by Dr. Friedrich Krebs represents the area of the two parts of the historical Palatinate as they existed during the eighteenth century.

Editor's note-During the twenty-five years that have passed since the appearance of Strassburger and Hinke's valuable book, a number of German genealogists have spent time and effort in order to identify the European homes of those pioneers. Dr. Friedrich Krebs has been very active in that field. In 1953 he and Milton Rubicam, editor of the National Genealogical Quarterly, published Emigrants from the Palatinate to the American Colonies in the 18th Century, Pennsylvania German Soc'y., Norristown, Pa., 1953. An article by Dr. Krebs, "Emigrants from Baden-Durlach 1749-55," appeared in

the National Genealogical Quarterly of March 1957, pp. 30-31.

## EARLY EMIGRATION from the COUNTY of HEIDELBERG, in the ELECTORAL PALATINATE, to AMERICA 1726-27.

Records deposited in the State Archives at Karlsruhe contain the following items:

#### 1726-27

#### Permits to emigrate granted to

JACOB KIESSINGER-A poor resident of Sandhofen-to migrate to "the Island of Pennsylvania."

- BRECHT, widow of Johann Brecht, and her two sons Stephan and Johann from the village of Schriesheim.

MICHEL WEDEL, a resident of Dossenheim.

DANIEL LE VENT, a resident of Hockenheim.

MICHEL DIEL, a citizen of Mannheim-Seckenheim, upon payment of 36 florins, 55 kreuzers.

MICHEL BOETTLE (Bettle), citizen of Mannheim-Seckenheim, upon payment of 27 florins, 48 kreuzers, " to the new country." Diel and Boettle arrived in Philadelphia on the William and Sarah and took the oath of allegiance 21 Sept. 1727.

JOHANN JACOB CUNZ, resident of Walldorf, to "the island of Pennsylvania;" arrived on the William and Sarah, took the oath of allegiance 21 Sept. 1727.

CHRISTIAN MÜLLER, resident of Walldorf, " to the island of Pennsylvania." identical with either:

"CHRISTYAN MILLER," arriving on the ship Molly, oath of allegiance 30 Sept. 1727, or "CHRISTIAN MILLER," arriving on the ship James Gooducill, oath of allegiance 27 Sept. 1727.

JOHANN ALEXANDER DIEBENDOERFER, resident of Schriesheim; arrived on the William and Sarah, oath of allegiance 21 Sept. 1727.

ANNA MARIE WILL, resident of Schriesheim.

JACOB MUELLER, resident of Mannheim-Neckarau.

ANDREAS ZIMMERMANN, resident of Meckesheim.

IOHANN ANDREAS HILL, resident of Mannheim-Sandhofen.

CHRISTOPH WALTHER, resident of Dossenheim, undoubtedly identical with the Christopher Walther who arrive on the ship William and Sarah 18 Sept. 1727.

Emigration from the County of Heidelberg 1741-1749

#### 1741

The records of the county of Heidelberg on file in the General State Archives at Karlsruhe contain the following items:

- VALENTIN ZWEISIG (ZWEISSIG), resident of Mauer, upon paying a fee of 3 florins, 30 kreuzers, was permitted to emigrate with his wife and four children " to the new
- "VALDIN (VALENTIN) ZWEISIG" arrived in Philadelphia on the ship Molly 16 Oct. 1741.
- MICHAEL MÜLLER, resident of Mauer, upon paying an emigration fee of 6 florins, was permitted to emigrate with his wife and five children.
- "MICHAEL MILLER " arrived on the ship Molly, 16 Oct. 1741.
- JOSEPH FABIAN, resident of Mauer,
- " JOSEPH FABIAN" arrived in Philadelphia on the ship Molly 16 Oct. 1741.
- JACOB HEZEL, resident of Schatthausen, made application for a permit, and presumably got it, but there seems to be no record of him as arriving in Philadelphia.
- JACOB MUELLER-a cooper from Wiesloch, with the assistance of the town authorities, received permission to emigrate.

#### 1742

CHRISTOPH GEISTER (GEISER?) of Eschelbronn was released from the status of a serf so that he might emigrate.

"CHRISTOF GEISER" arrived in Philadelphia 21 Sept. 1742.

- Indigent brothers MICHAEL and DIETER DANNER of Walldorf were permitted to emigrate. They landed as Michael and Dietrich Danner on the ship Robert and Alice; took oath of allegiance 24 Sept 1742.
- 1743
- CASPAR HAUCK, resident of Helmstadt, received a permit to migrate " to the island of Pennsylvania."

DIETRICH MUELLER, a baker, and

JACOB HOFFMANN, a shoemaker, both of Zuzenhausen, were permitted to leave without paying the usual fee because of their being poor. Jacob Hoffman arrived on the ship Rosannah, oath of allegiance 26 Sept. 1743. ABRAHAM SCHWANN, from Schriesheim.

- GEORG HOFFSTAETTER all from Schriesheim, after paying the ten per cent tax on the possessions they were taking out with them, received permits to emigrate.
- "HYRONIMUS TRAUTTMANN and BERNHART DUEBINGER" arrived in Philadelphia on the ship St. Andrew 7 Oct. 1743.

#### 1744

In the year 1744 permission to emigrate was given to JOHANN ESAIAS STEIN from Zuzenhausen with wife, one stepson and three stepdaughters.

IOHANN ADAM KREHEBUEHL from Bammenthal with his wife and three children. GEORG WELCKER from Spechbach with his wife and two children, and CONRAD LANG, from Spechbach, with his wife and four children.

A group of persons from Zuzenhausen, namely ANNA MARIA (REGINA) HEYL-MANN, single; GEORG KIRSCH and his wife and two small children; ANNA DOROTHEA, widow of GEORG LICHT(N)ER and her 16 yr old son; two single men JOHANN JACOB KIRSCH and CONRAD KIRSCH.

During the next few years the number of permits practically reached the zero point. [The War of the Austrian Succession 1740-48 ended with the treaty of Aix la Chapelle-Ed.]

- In 1747 there was one permit granted, namely to a young man who had been exempted from military service, CHRISTIAN RUPP, from Daudenzell. He was obliged to pay his ten Pfennig tax amounting to 11 florins and an additional fee of two florins 40 kreuzers for an emergency locker. Christian Rupp arrived in Philadelphia on the ship Restauration, oath of allegiance 9 Oct. 1747.
- VEIT MEISTER, born at Bargen, son of Georg Bernhard Meister, married at Ort Hoffenheim, near Sinsheim, in 1744, and at that time paid 3 florins to receive a certificate of manumission. In 1787 the government of Dilsberg published a statement that he and his wife and children had emigrated to America in 1751 arriving in Philadelphia on the Shirley 5 Sept. 1751.

Beginning 1749 the number of permits for migration to America from the county of Heidelberg increased rapidly.

#### III

#### Emigration from County of Heidelberg 1737, 1738 1751, and 1754

The authorities of the County of Heidelberg, Electoral Paltinate, according to records now filed in the State Archives at Karlsruhe, granted permission to a number of persons to emigrate to America, upon payment of manumission fees. Such a fee freed the subject from feudal obligations to his landlord, the local petty nobleman.

Notable is the fact that of a considerable number of persons who received permission in 1751 relatively few can be identified in the lists of ships' passengers arriving in Philadelphia. There are two probable explanations: 1. not all ships from Holland or England came to Philadelphia; 2. some passengers died on board ship during the voyage.

Following are some emigrants:

1737

CHRISTIAN EWIG, resident of Wilhelmsfeld, upon payment of a manumission tax of 50 florins, received permission to migrate with his wife and three children to " the island of Pennsylvania." Arrived on the *Townshend*, took oath of allegiance Oct. (2000)

CASPAR WEDEL, resident of Wieblingen (modern Heidelberg-Wieblingen), upon payment of a manumission tax of 9 florins 54 kreuzers, received permission to emigrate to " the new land."

1738

JOHANN GEORG ARNOLD of Zuzenhausen, district of Sinsheim, upon payment of 10 florins as a manumission fee, was granted permission to emigrate with his wife and children, arrived Philadelphia on the Elisabeth 30 Oct. 1738.

JOHANN LEONHARD NOTZ, resident of Zuzenhausen, upon payment of 28 florins as a manumission fee, permitted to emigrate.

"LENHART NOTZ" arrived on the ship Two Sisters, took oath of allegiance Sept. 1738.

JOHANNES ROEHRER, a resident of Mauer, district of Heidelberg, upon payment of 10 florins as a manumission fee, permitted to emigrate to America with his wife and "IOHANNES ROELING ROELING TO THE PROPERTY OF THE PROPERTY O

" JOHANNES ROEHRER " (Johann Gottfried Rehrer) arrived on the ship Robert and Alice 11 Sept. 1738.

For the year 1751, there is an unusually large number of emigration permits:

PETER BENNINGER, a resident of Epfenbach, district of Sinsheim, with wife and four children, apparently without payment of the usual manumission fee.

HEINRICH BECK, a resident of Epfenbach, district of Sinsheim, with wife Anna Margaretha and son Johann Joerg. The latter was required to pay 11 florins for manumission and 10 florins for unpaid taxes.

ADAM BUCKLE (BICKLE), a schoolmaster of the Reformed Church at Spechbach, district of Heidelberg, permitted to emigrate with his wife and children gratis, because he was poor.

JOHANN GEORG ERNST, a resident of Lobenfeld, district of Heidelberg, permitted to emigrate. BECKENBACH

BECKENBACH, —, widow, a resident of Eiterbach, applied for a permit on behalf of herself and her children. After long negotiations, she paid 130 florins as a manumission fee and 177 florins and an additional 30 florins to satisfy the ten Pfenning tax on t alue of what she took with her.

"CASPER BECKENBACH, GEORG ADAM BECKENBACH, GEORG LEON-HARDT BECKENBACH," all arrived on the ship Janet 7 Oct. 1751.

ELISABETH HILD, daughter of a citizen of Handschuhsheim (modern Heidelberg-Handschuhsheim) after paying a fee of five florins received a permit.

JOHANNES SCHILLING, a serf, residing at Richardshausen, district of Sinsheim, paid five florins as a manumission fee and thirteen florins for the ten Pfennig tax; arrived on the ship *Phoenix* Sept. 1751.

ANDREAS WETZSTEIN, resident of Gauangeloch, district of Heidelberg, paid ten florins as manumission fee and nine florins to satisfy the ten Pfennig tax. Permitted to emigrate with wife and two children.

SAMUEL SCHWEIGERT, (SCHWEIKERT), resident of Bargen, district of Sinsheim, after paying ten florins, received a permit.

LEONHARDT SCHEID, resident of Schriesheim, district of Mannheim, received a permit. At the same time Adam Heinrich Hoffmann, a former resident who had departed without paying his manumission fee, was declared free. (A relative may have paid it for him.)

JOHANN MICHAEL ROESCH, a day-laborer of Dossenheim, district of Heidelberg, permitted to emigrate with his wife and children without making any payment.

NICKLAS REINHARD, CASPAR HECKMANN, ADAM EISENHAUER, three daylaborers from Wilhelmsfeld, upon paying the usual fees, received permits to emigrate.

PETER LEYER, from Heiligenkreuzsreinach.

JACOB REICHERT, from Heddesbach, district of Heidelberg.

NICLAS ZIMMERMANN, from Altneudorf.

These three and their wives desired to emigrate. It is of interest that one of the three couples did not get the desired permit, because his wife was a Roman Catholic, and " in the land to which they plan to emigrate the exercise of the Catholic religion has not been introduced."

#### BALTHASAR KOENIG JOERG HAPPES JOHANNES WAGNER

JOERG LUECKER—four citizens of Schoenau, district of Heidelberg, permitted to depart without paying the usual fees because of their scant means.

"GEORG LICKER, BALZAR KOENIG, JOHANES WAGNER, and GEORGE HAPPES" arrived on the ship Queen of Denmark 4 Oct. 1751.

In 1753 there are two cases on record.

JOHANNES MUSSELMANN, an Anabaptist from Zuzenhausen, district of Sinsheim, secured a license to marry the daughter of Samuel Petzer, an Anabaptist, of Meckesheim, and also a permit to emigrate to America.

"HANS MUSSELMANN" arrived in Philadelphia on the ship Patience 17 Sept. 1753. GEORG MARTIN, resident of Neunkirchen, district of Mosbach, received a permit for himself, his wife, and three children.

" JOERG MARTHIN " arrived in Philadelphia on the ship Edinbu

Sept. 1753.

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In 1754 the following were permitted to emigrate to America:

- JOSEPH BUBIGKOFFER—an inhabitant, not a citizen, of Rohrhof, near Bruehl, district of Mannheim, received a permit gratis because of his poverty.
- " JOSEF BUBIGKOFFER " arrived in Philadelphia on the ship Brothers 30 Sept. 1754.
- NICLAUS FEDEROLFF, of Dossenheim, district of Heidelberg, received a permit to emigrate to South Carolina with his wife and three children.
- JOHANNES KRAUSS, day-laborer of Bruchhauserhof (modern Bruchhausen), Sandhausen, district of Heidelberg) was permitted to depart with wife and children without paying the usual fees.
- PHILIPP LEYER, widower from Aglasterhausen, district of Mosbach, and his six children were permitted to emigrate without paying the usual fees, because of his having no means.
- DAVID MUELLER, resident of Altneudorf, district of Heidelberg, was permitted to emigrate gratis.
- JACOB SCHIFFERDECKER, resident of Neunkirchen, district of Mosbach, paid the usual fees and received a permit; arrived in Philadelphia on the ship Henrietta 22 Oct. 1754.
- CATHARINA ZIMMERMANN of Moosbrunn, district of Heidelberg, secured both a license to be married and one to emigrate.
- JOHANN STEPHAN MARTIN, son of a citizen in Neckarkatzenbach, district of Mosbach, received manumussion after having emigrated.
- "HANS STEFFAN MARTHIN" arrived in Philadelphia on the ship Sbirley 5 Sept. 1751.

### Emigrants from Wuerttemberg

A hasty examination of the records of the government of Wuerttemberg for 1749-50, now on file at State Archives in Ludwigsburg, revealed a number of entries concerning persons who had expressed the desire to emigrate to America, i.e., Pennsylvania. A few of them could be identified in the lists of Strassburger-Hinke:

- ANDREAS HERTER, from Oberdigisheim, county of Balingen; arrived in Philadelphia on the ship Osgood 29 Sept. 1750.
- GOTTLIEB MITTELBERGER, from Enzweihingen, county of Vaihingen. He "petitions that his divorce be hastened, so that he may be able to take a certificate of divorce with him to Pennsylvania." He made a round trip and published a book about it, Gottlieb Mittelberger's Voyage to Pennsylvania in the Year 1750 and his return voyage to Germany in the year 1754." (Frankfurt/Main, and Leipzig, 1756, 110 pp).
  HANS JEPO DETATES.
- HANS JERG FELBER, from Baach, county of Schondorf, petitioned that he be permitted to er e with his wife to Pennsylvania. Arrived on the ship Elisabeth 5 Sept. 1751

JOHANNES ESE (N) WEIN, from Baltmannsweiler, county of Schondorf. Arrived on ship Patience 11 Aug. 1750.

HANSS MARTIN HERRE, from Zillhausen, county of Balingen, son of the local magistrate and tax collector Simon Herre. According to a record dated 6 May 1765 Hans Herre had married in 1743 Anna Maria Sassler. In 1749 they and three children "had emigrated to the American island of Pennsylvanai."

"HANS MARTIN HERR" arrived in October 1749 on the ship Fane; oath of allegiance 17 Oct. 1749.

In 1765 Hans Herre re-visited his old home, to get his share in the settlement of an estate. For 100 florins he quit-claimed his share to the other heirs. When he was about to return to Pennsylvania, the Wuert-temberg government demanded an emigration fee of 43 florins, 65 Kreuzer, and  $4\frac{1}{2}$  Heller. He did not pay it. In the year 1770 he petitioned the government to cancel the charge, but it refused. Finally his relatives had to pay the charges.

#### ADVERTISEMENTS for MISSING HEIRS

- JOHANN GERLACH BORNHUETTER, of Daaderhuette (Daaden, a village in the district of Altenkirchen), Weserwald. He "left for America more than twenty years ago." Advertisement of government of Friedewald, Baden, 18 Feb. 1777; published in OPZ ("Oberpostamts Zeitung") 4 July 1777.
- " JOHN GERLACH BORNHEKER," aged 29. Philadelphia 2 Oct. 1753; ship Edinburgh.
- JOHANN WILHELM STRUNCK of Weitefeld, district of Altenkirchen, left there "thirteen years ago." Advertisement of government of Friedewald, Baden, 18 Feb. 1777, published in OPZ 4 July 1777. Cf. Strassburger-Hinke 249 C, 29 Nov. 1764.
- EVA CATHARINA FATH, legitimate daughter of Georg Fath, deceased, of Offenbach, district of Landau, Palatinate, "left this village as a single woman more than twenty years ago, went to Pennsylvania, and has sent no word back since then." Advertisement of government of Landeck Klingenmuenster, Electoral Palatinate, 5 June 1778, published in OPZ 3 July and 9 Nov. 1778.
- JACOB and ELISABETH HUTH, of Engelstadt, district of Bingen, left there about thirty years ago and, according to common report, went to Pennsylvania. Advertisement of government 13 Mch 1778; published in OPZ 12 May, 30 May, and 9 June 1778.
- " JACOB HUTH," aged 29, Loyal Judith 2 Aug. 1743.
- JOHANNES JUENGST, native of Grosskarben, district of Friedberg, Hessia "went to Pennsylvania twenty-six years ago." Advertisement of government of H. Burg Friedberg 13 July 1778, published in OPZ 24 Nov. 1778. Arrived on the ship Edinburgh 2 Oct. 1753.
- HENRICH KRON, native of Essenheim, district of Mainz, "mierer das early as 1748 from there to America." Advertisement of County of O Palatinate, 19 Jan. 1776, published in OPZ 30 Aug. and 14 Dec. 1776.

" HEND<sup>6</sup> CROWL Farrived on the ship Hampshire 7 Sept. 1748.

VEIT MEISTER, son of the deceased court employe at Bargen (district of Sinsheim, Baden) Georg Bernhard Meister " migrated as early as 1751 with wife and children from the village of Hoffenheim belonging to the Baron of Gemmingen, district of Sinsheim, to America. Advertisement of the government of Dilsberg, Electoral Palatinate 10 Dec. 1787, published in OPZ 8 Feb. 1788.

" VEIT MEISTER " arrived on ship Sbirley 5 Sept. 1751.

GEORG THOMAS and MARIA BARBARA OSTERSTOCK, children of the deceased Johann Philipp Osterstock, subjects to and under the jurisdiction of Olnhausen (Wuerttemberg) 44 and 53 years old respectively, in 1751 went to America." Advertisement of the government of the Baron of Berlichingen at Jagsthausen 7 Dec. 1773, published in the Imperial Official Post News 10 Jan 1780.

"THOMAS OSTERSTOCK " on ship St. Andrew 14 Sept. 1751.

JOHANN DIETRICH REINER, born at Schwaigern, under the rule of the Count of Neipperg, Wuerttemberg, emigrated in April 1749 with his wife Maria Margaretha, nee Schleicher, and six children named Christian about 30 years old, Maria Magdalena 24 years old, Margaretha 22 years old, Sara 20 years old, Johannes 18 years old, Eberhardt about 16 years old, from their home to Pennsylvania. Announcement of the Council and state officials, also the Burgomaster and the court at Bonnigheim in the "Zabergau," Wuerttemberg, 27 Oct. 1777, published OPZ 16 March 1778.

The Lutheran churchbook at the Evangelical parsonage Meimsheim contains the following: Johann Dietrich Reiner, son of Friedrich Reiner, citizen and cooper at Schwaigern, was married 9 Oct. 1715 to Maria Margaretha Schleicher, daughter of the citizen and cobbler Schleicher. Their children, listed in the Evangelical churchbook, were: Johann Christian, b. 10 April 1718; Maria Magdalena, b. 21 Sept. 1720; Maria Margaretha, b. 12 Feb. 1723; Maria Sara, b. 2 Mai 1724; Georg Philipp, b. 30 Jan. 1727, d. 3 May 1729; Anna Maria, b. 9 June 1728, d. 8 June 1729; Johannes b. 13 July 1730; Eberharst Friedrich, b. 23 March 1733.

" JOHAN DIETRICH REINER " arrived on ship Fane 17 Oct. 1749.

#### VI

#### Emigrants from Oppenheim 1742-49

The records of the county of Oppenheim, in the former Electoral Palatinate, which are now filed in the City Archives at Oppenheim on Rhine, contain information about a few persons who emigrated during the first half of the 18th century. They furnish evidence of permits granted, not of actual emigration.

The former county of Oppenheim included the present city of Oppenheim, the market place Nierstein, and the villages of Dexheim, Strassburger and Hinke's Pennsylvania German Pioneers 243

Schwabsburg, Oberingelheim, Niederingelheim, Daxweile, Sauerschwabenheim, Gorsswinternheim, Wackernheim, Freinweinheim, Bubenheim, Elsheim, Stadtecken, and Essenheim. The many enigrants from Essenheim are not included in the following list, because they have been published. In order to avoid repetition we will list only the date of the permit, the name, the residence, the fees paid, the ship, and the date of arrival in Philadelphia.

#### 1742

Permits and manumission certificates to the following residents of Stadtecken, namely, LORENTZ BLAESS, PETER WESTERBERGER, JOHANN KIEL, FRIED-ERICH MENGEL, and JOHANNES DAUM, "to emigrate to Pennsylvania, where they have friends residing." On 3 Sept. 1742 on the ship Loyal Juditb "LORENTZ PLACE, JOHANNES KUEHL, JOHANNES DOMIE, FRIETZ MENGEL, and PETER WASENBERGER."

PETER WASHINGLAGER. Permits granted 17 April 1742, to FRIEDRICH PFEIL, JOHANN LEHN, residents of Gross-winternheim. They arrived 3 Sept. 1742 on the same ship.

In the same year a report to the county officials stated that certain residents of Oberingelheim, namely, Philip Odernheimer, Peter Weitzel, Ulrich Strassburger, and the widow of Nicolaus Doerr, had "recently sent their sons, whose names had been entered on the latest conscription list for military service, to the new land, and with the knowledge of the entire town, had given each of them 100 florins and some food for the voyage." The chief magistrate of the village of Oberingelheim was held responsible by the higher authorities. Johannes Odernheimer, Johann Paul Weytzel, Johann Heinrich Doerr, and Johann Andreas Strassburger arrived 3 Sept. 1742 on the Loyal Judith. The last named returned to Germany for a visit and came back to Philadelphia on the ship Mercury in October 1769.

- 25 February 1743 permit granted to PHILIP HARDT of Niederingelheim, upon payment of 10 Pfenning; permits to NICOLAUS RUNCKEL and NICOLAUS KEL-LER of Wackernheim. They arrived 2 Sept. 1743 on the Loyal Judith.
- 3 February 1748 permits' "to migrate to the island of Pennsylvania" after paying 15 florins and 10 florins for manumission certificates and the usual 10 Pfenning fees, to FRIEDRICH PLATZ (PLOTZ) and ADAM IMHAEUSSER (IMMENHAUSER) of Stadtecken. They arrived on the ship Hampsbire 7 Sept. 1748.
- 9 March 1748 permits to FRANZ GRAFF (GROVE), with wife and two children,
   9 March 1748 permits to FRANZ GRAFF (GROVE), with wife and two children,
   9 BARTEL KRAEMER with wife and five children, ADAM WEISS with wife, all from Grosswinternheim, also WILHELM LAYMEISTER with wife and children from Schwabenheim, all upon paying the 10 Pfennig fee; to indigents WOLF-GANG WOLF and HOSTERMANN from Grosswinternheim without such payment. They arrived 7 Sept. 1748 on the Hampshire. Their names are given as

## FRANTZ GROVE, JOHANN WILHELM LEYMEISTER, WOLFGANG WULFF, HANS JACOB OSTERMANN, and JOHANN ADAM WEISS.

- 29 March 1748 permit to JOHANN BISCHOFF from Grosswinternheim," who was so in debt that he had to sell his property and did not know how he would be able to support himself." He arrived on the same ship, the *Hampsbire* 7 Sept. 1748.
- 14 May 1748 permits to JOHANN JACOB RUNCKEL and FRIEDRICH HAMMER from Wackernheim. The former paid 40 florins, the latter 10 florins. Both arrived with the preceding on the *Hampshire*.
- CHRISTIAN RAMB from Elsheim paid 43 florins for a permit. But his name has not been found in the ship's lists.
- 21 March 1749 permit to PHILIPP HABER with wife and three children from Stadecken paid 54 florins for manumission and 54 florins for the 10 Pfenning tax; arrived 27 Sept. 1749 on the Isaac.
- 16 April 1749 permit to NICOLAUS REISINGER from Niederingelheim, upon paying the 10 Pfenning tax; arrived 26 Sept. 1749 on the Dragon.
- 29 April 1749 to three men from Oberingelheim, ADAM DOERR, upon payment of the 10 Pfenning tax, ANTON OSTER and WENDEL RUNCKEL, gratis, "all three being indigent and having bad records." Doerr arrived 9 Sept, 1749 on the St. Andrew. Oster arrived 26 Sept. on the Dragon. Runckel remained in Oberingel-heim, altho the authorities were anxious to get rid of him.
- 14 May 1749 permit to FRIEDRICH BOHR from Wackernheim, after paying ten florins, arrived 9 Sept. 1749 on the St. Andrew.

Christian Meckel from Elsheim had some difficulties. His oldest son was not emigrating with him. The authorities insisted that his share of his father's estate be retained and safely invested for him. Christian with wife and three younger children arrived 27 Sept. 1749 on the *Isaac*.

29 April 1749 PHILIPP MERZ, locksmith, from Nierstein, upon paying the 10 Pfenning tax, arrived 15 Sept. 1749 on the Edinburgh. ULRICH IORDAN (IORDAN)

- ULRICH JORDAN (JORDTE), an Anabaptist from Haxthaeuserhof near Ingelheim, also paid the 10 Pfenning tax. He arrived 9 Sept. 1749 on the St. Andrew. The Roman Catholic widow CATHAPINA DEVINEED
- The Roman Catholic widow CATHARINA PFEIFFER from Essenheim migrated "without permission of the authorities, secretly, to Pennsylvania." Therefore whatever possessions she had left behind were confiscated. Johann Rooss and Abraham Schweickart from Niederingelheim also emigrated "secretly," and their property was confiscated.

#### VII

Emigrants to America from the region now a part of the Palatinate and that of Nahe and Hunsrueck. The records are now filed in the Archives at Speyer. Strassburger and Hinke's Pennsylvania German Pioneers 245

- JOHANN GEORG and CHRISTIAN, sons of CONRAD STRIBECK, citizen and woolspinner in Hornbach, district of Zweibruecken, by his first wife ELISA-BETHA SCHAEFFER, and their mother's brother together with their grandmother Elisabetha Schaeffer migrated as early as 1735 into the new land, with the knowledge and approval of His Highness. Since the grandparents were still living and the children had not received any inheritance from their mother, they were reported to have taken with them the portion derived from their grandmother. ELISABETH SHEVER, JERICH STREBECK, CHRISTIAN STREBECK, arrived on the ship *Pennsylvania Merchant* 18 Sept. 1733.
- SAMUEL MAUSS, son of the official Friedrich Mauss of Hornbach and his wife SU-SANNA MUELLER, former citizen of Zweibruecken, migrated to America " about 1754." He arrived 14 Sept. 1753 on the ship Edinburgb.
- PHILIPP WILD, son of the citizen and tanner Nickel Wild of Hornbach and his wife ANNA MARIA, "about four years ago migrated to the new land with the knowledge, recognized and to be recognized, of the government. Before his departure he sold his... inheritance to his brother Conrad Wild at Oberhausen." Deposition made 3 May 1760.
- CATHARINA HENGE, daughter of the deceased citizen and tanner ("Rotgerber") Samuel Mueller at Hornbach and his wife Maria Margaretha Mauss, had been married to Georg Henge and had had a son, named Philipp (now sixteen). She was divorced from her husband "pro adulterii." Later she went to America, where she after having made the necessary legal depositions was married to a man named Fischer. (Emigrated before 31 Jan. 1777.)
- LUDWIG LEINER of Hornbach, "emigrated as a wool weaver." According to a deposition of his brother Georg Leiner he died in 1784 in America.
- PHILIPP BLEY, son of the citizen and cooper Hanss Werner Bley of Hornbach and his wife Elisabeth Huber, "twenty-two years ago went into Alsace and married at Trachenbronn, from where he removed to America." Deposition made in 1770; (hence Philipp migrated about 1748).
- DANIEL and BALTHASAR ZUTTER, sons of Benedikt Balthasar Zutter of Hornbach, woolspinner, "left secretly and migrated to America." (Deposition 7 June 1763.) Daniel and Balthasar Zutter arrived on ship *Chance* 1 Nov. 1763.
- THEOBALD PFAFF " eight years ago ran away from Eisenbach, district of Kusel, and emigrated to America. He left nine children behind, of whom three are in the ducal orphanage at Homburg." (Deposition 29 Jan. 1777.)

THEOBALD PFAFF arrived 26 Oct. 1768 in ship Betsy.

Note: Pfaff could not have been born in Eisenbach, because the proof of his migration was filed in Hornbach.

PAUL HOCHSTRASER, son of the town official Samuel Hochstraser at Brenschelbach, district of Homburg, in the Saar, and his wife Elisabetha. He established himself as a tailor in Philadelphia. (Deposition 18 April 1761.) According to a power of attorney which Paul Hochstraser and his sister Catharina signed 23 Jan. 1764 at Albany, Province of New York, they were living there.

'PAUL HOCHSTRASER " arrived 14 Sept. 1753 in ship Edinburg.

- n the year 1763 a Jacob Hochstraser emigrated to America, presumably he was a brother of Paul, for local records show that Paul had a brother of that name.
- HEINRICH HALLER, son of the citizen and tailor Jacob Haller of Walshausen, district of Zweibruecken, and his first wife ELISABETH MOSER. "deserted from the old Ducal Guard and emigrated to Pennsylvania." He man about 1748 without having secured manumission. Therefore his property, an inheritance

amounting to 102 florins was confiscated by the government of Zweibruecken. Presumably identical with Heinrich Haller, 18 Aug. 1750, in the ship St. Andrew.

- ANNA APPOLONIA VOGELSANG, daughter of the citizen Nickel Gentes at Breitfurt, (district of Homburg, Saar), was married to Georg Vogelgesang, the vounger, (apparently, also a resident of Breitfurt) living in America. (Deposition 6 May 1765.) Presumably "GEORG VOGELSANG" who arrived 21 Oct. 1761 in the Snow Sauirrel.
- GEORG NEU, inhabitant and citizen at Breitfurt (d. 18 July 1756) and his wife CHRISTINA MARGARETA GENTESS had the following children:
  - 1. JOSEPH NEU, "who about 18 years ago migrated to America and is about 40 vears old."
  - 2. PETER NEU, " who also some five years ago removed to America and is about 30 years old." (Deposition, 8 Feb. 1758.)
- ABRAHAM SCHMIDT, citizen and court employe ("Gerichtsmann") at Breitfurt, had:
  - 1. MATTHEIS, "living in America."
- 2. GEORG, unmarried, 30 years old, in America. (Deposition, 7 Oct. 1760.)
- JACOB WELKER, son of Wilhelm Welcker of Breitfurt, "who according to report has gone to America," emigrated before 4 Dec. 1777.
- Either "JACOB WELCKER," who arrived 26 Oct. 1768 in the ship Crawford or " JACOB WELCKER " who arrived 17 Sept. 1771 in the ship Minerva.
- HEINRICH KUNZ of Boeckweiler (district of Homburg, Saar), "Heinrich Kunz, son of the deceased citizen ("Gemeindeman") of the same name, at Boeckweiler, left this land anno 1764 and, according to report, in defiance of the highest existing ordinance migrated to America." Notice in the Frankfurter Kayserliche Reichs-Ober-Amtspost Zeitung of 17 Sept. 1787 (literally "Imperial Higher Official Post News published in Frankfurt "). According to local records Heinrich Kunz had learned the trade of a wagon maker and had gone out in 1764 as a wandering journeyman. On 23 August 1768 he wrote a letter to Jonathan Heger from Canageschick, Maryland, which was the last anyone in his home town received from him. JOHANNES KELLER, son of Daniel Keller of Boeckweiler, was reported to be "estab-
- lished in the new land and married." He emigrated before 19 Oct. 1776.
- "Children of WILHELM SCHUNK of Walsheim, district of Homburg, Saar, and his wife CATHARINA SCHWARTZ, namely: JOHANNES, CATHARINA, ELISA-BETH, MARIA, SIMON, have been in America the past nine or ten years." Record 18 Oct. 1781.

The following names of emigrants to America from the region of Nahe and Hunsrueck were copied from the Lutheran churchbooks at Hueffelsheim and Loetzbeuren and from the Reformed church books at Hundsbach.

- IOHANN GEORG REITZEL (REUTZEL), a cobbler at Hueffelsheim, district of Kreuznach, and wife (ANNA) SYBILLA had children:
  - 1. ANNA MARIA, b. 2 Aug. 1720. "This parish child migrated to the new land."
  - 2. MARIA WILHELMINA, b. 2 Sept. 1734, " went with her father into the new 11." 12

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3. JOHANN PETER, b. 28 Oct. 1937. "went with his paren. 741 into the new land."

" JOHANN GEORG REUTZEL," arrived 17 Oct. 1741, aged 45 years.

IOHANNES WOLFFSKEHL, m. 19 Nov. 1730 at Hueffelsheim to ANNA MARIA

- VIEL; children born at Hueffelsheim:
  - 1. ELISABETHA, b. 28 Dec. 1733.
  - 2. ANNA MARGRETHA, b. 18 Nov. 1735.
  - 3. MARIA AGNES, b. 27 Jan. 1738.
  - All three " went with their father into the new land 1742."
- " JOHANNES WOLFFSKEHL," 3 Sept. 1742, ship Loyal Judith.
  - 1. MARIA, 28 Feb. 1711 " to the new land 1742 " (wife of J. Wolffskehl, cf. above). 2. JOHAN JACOB, b. 22 Nov. 1718 " went 17 May 1767 into the new land."
- JOHANN MICHAEL RECH, b. 1 March 1751 at Hueffelsheim, son of JOHANN
- CONRAD RECH, and his wife ANNA MARGRETA. "Children and parents went to the new land."
- CATHARINA ELISABETHA SCHNEE, b. 27 Aug. 1730 at Loetzbeuren, district of Zell, Mosel region, daughter of Johannes Schnee and his wife Maria Margretha. "Emigrated to Pennsylvania 1751."
- MARIA CATHARINA HOFF. b. 26 May 1732 at Loctzbeuren, daughter of Johann Dieterich and his wife Susanna Elisabetha: "This person and her husband have gone to Pennsylvania."
- JOHANN WILHELM LUTZ, b. 12 Sept. 1732 at Loetzbeuren, son of Matthes Luetz and his wife Elisabetha Catharina, "left for Pennsylvania 1751."

ANNA ELISABETHA FRANTZ, b. 25 March 1735 at Loetzbeuren, daughter of Johann Nicol Frantz and his wife Maria Elisabetha: " said to have migrated to Penn-

ELISABETHA CATHARINA HEYL, b. 4 Jan. 1733 at Hundsbach, district of Kreuzsylvania 1751," nach, " The father of this child has gone to Pennsylvania."

The following names of emigrants were found in "Akt Zweibruecken III No. 3358, "Act concerning dismissal . . . of subjects as well as the exporting of property acquired at marriage (Heirats gut), and the payment of the ten penny tax (1484-1792)," in the Archives at Speyer.

JOHANN NICKEL BEYER, b. at Kleinich, district of Bernkastel, son of Matthias

also JOHANN GEORG BARTGES, son of MATTHIAS BARTGES of the same place. both are permitted by the government of Sponheim to migrate from Trarbach to

- Pennsylvania " in order to perfect themselves in the trade they have learned. But if they do not return within three years, they will have to purchase their manumission, and in the mean time their prospective inheritance here is being held as a for-
- MICHAEL BARTGES, a tanner by trade, was permitted to depart for Pennsylvania on similar conditions.
- " MICHAEL BARTJES," ship Two Brothers, 15 Sept. 1748.
- JOHANN NICKEL NEU, son of Christoffel Neu, 2 weaver by trade, and JOHANN PETER VELTEN (FEHLTEN), son of Conrad Fehlten, a cobbler by trade, received permits to emigrate to America on similar conditions.

"PETER FELTE," ship Two Brothers, 15 Sept. 1748.

JOHANN CONRAD LAHM, a tailor by trade, son of Peter Lahm also JOHN MICHEL NEU, linen-weaver, son of Philipp Neu, also MATTHIAS BAYER, son of Matthias Bayer, Sr., all of Kleinich, were granted permission by the government of Trarbach 26 April 1741 to go to Pennsylvania, on condition that they either return within two years or pay their manumission fees.

That all of them emigrated is proved by the records. However, Matthias Bayer and Johann Michel Neu are said to have died soon after their arrival in America.

- " JOHANN KONRADT LAHM," aged 22 years, arrived 20 Nov. 1741, in the ship Europa.
- JOHANN PETER HEHN or HENN, son of Nicol Hehn of Horbruch, district of Bernkastel, according to a report of 11 March 1746 to the government at Trarbach, "emigrated anno 1741 to the so called new land."
- MARIA CATHARINA LAHM and NICKEL LAHM, children of Matthias Lahm of Oberkleinich (district of Bernkastel) according to a report of the magistrate of Kleinich to the government at Trarbach 8 May 1741, "desire to migrate to the new land."

" JOHANN NICKLAUS LAHM" arrived 29 Sept. 1741, ship Lydia.

"This is to inform you that during the past year two young fellows under the pretext of completing their journeyman's stage (in learning their trade) emigrated to the so called new land. One, Johann Peter Lorentz, is a native of Hochscheid, the other, Johann Peter Lahm, is a native of Oberkleinich." Report of a local magistrate to the government at Sponheim 12 May 1741. An entry in the records of the government at Trarbach confirms that both had emigrated in 1740.

PETER LORENTZ and PETER LAAM," 27 Sept. 1740 arrived in Philadelphia on ship Lydia.

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# The Hamburg Passenger Lists, 1850–1934

#### WHAT ARE THE HAMBURG PASSENGER LISTS?

The Hamburg passenger lists contain the names of millions of Europeans who emigrated through Hamburg between 1850 and 1934 (except 1915–1919). Nearly one-third of the people who emigrated from central and eastern Europe during this time are included on these lists. If you have ancestors who emigrated from these areas, the Hamburg passenger lists could provide important genealogical information about them, including their hometowns. Extensive indexes make these records easier to use than most other passenger lists and emigration records.

The records of Europeans who emigrated through other ports, such as Bremen, LeHavre, Amsterdam, Rotterdam, and Antwerp, have either been destroyed or are not available for research at the Family History Library.

You may not need to look at the Hamburg passenger lists if you already know where your ancestor was born in Europe. Furthermore, you may be able to find your ancestor's birthplace in other sources, such as local records where the person resided.

The Hamburg passenger lists are made up of two sections. Both sections have an index.

- 1. The Direct Passenger Lists include passengers who left Hamburg, Germany, and sailed directly to their destination without stopping at other European ports.
- 2. The Indirect Passenger Lists include passengers who stopped at another European port before sailing to their final destination. About 20 percent of the immigrants leaving Europe took indirect routes.

The Hamburg passenger lists and indexes are on 486 rolls of microfilm at the Family History Library plus an additional 48 rolls of microfilm for the Klüber Kartei, a newly acquired index for the Hamburg Passenger lists covering approximately 1850 to 1871. For film numbers, search the Locality section of the Family History Library Catalog under:

#### GERMANY, HAMBURG, HAMBURG -EMIGRATION AND IMMIGRATION

If you are using the compact disc version of the catalog (FamilySearch<sup>®</sup>), select the computer number search and enter 11064. For the Klüber Kartei, select computer number 755339.

#### USING THE PASSENGER LIST INDEXES

#### Four Steps to Follow

- 1. Select the best index to use.
- 2. Search the index.
- 3. Obtain the passenger list.
- 4. Search the passenger list.

# STEP 1: SELECT THE BEST INDEX TO USE.

Before using the index, you need to know the year the emigrant left Germany. The 1900, 1910, and 1920 U.S. censuses are a good place to begin searching for this kind of information. The census provides the year a person arrived in the United States. If possible, find out whether the emigrant traveled directly to his or her destination or stopped at other ports along the way.

Most of the Hamburg passenger lists have been indexed. The only ones not indexed are those from 1850 to 1854. They are arranged alphabetically. There are three sets of indexes: the Fifteen-year Index to the Direct Hamburg Passenger Lists, 1856–1871; the Klüber Kartei, covering approximately 1850–1871; and the regular indexes.

If the emigrant departed between 1850 and 1854, search the alphabetical passenger list for those years. If the emigrant departed between 1856 and 1871, search the fifteen-year index or Klüber Kartei first. If the person is not listed in these, you may still wish to search the regular indexes.

#### **The Fifteen-Year Index**

The Fifteen-year Index arranges all the names on the direct lists from 1856 to 1871 in one alphabetical index. Though it is convenient to use, this index is not complete. After checking the index, you may still need to use the Klüber Kartei or the regular indexes for the same time period. The regular indexes are more complete, but they are more difficult to use.

#### The Klüber Karteien

The Klüber Kartei, or Klüber Card File, was filmed in 1994. It consists of two separate card indexes that cover both the direct and indirect Hamburg passenger lists for the following years:

Card File 1 (Kartei 1) Includes entries lettered from A–Z for:

> Direct Passenger Lists, 1856–1871 Indirect Passenger Lists, 1866–1867

Card File 2 (Kartei 2) Includes entries lettered from A–Z for:

> Direct Passenger Lists, 1850–1871 Indirect Passenger Lists, 1854–1865

Although the two files overlap in time periods, both are necessary since neither file is complete. These card files are considered more complete than the Fifteen-year Index when card files 1 and 2 are used together.

#### **The Regular Indexes**

Both the Direct Passenger Lists and the Indirect Passenger Lists have regular indexes. The indexes are divided into segments that cover one year or part of a year. The direct indexes begin in 1854 and end in 1934. The indirect indexes begin in 1854 and end in 1910.

#### **STEP 2: SEARCH THE INDEX.**

Use the following instructions to search the index you selected in step 1.

When you find a person in an index, use the information in the index to find the person in the actual passenger list. See step 3 to learn how to do this.

#### Using the Fifteen-year Index

Using the table shown in figure 1, get the film on which your ancestor's name would appear.

The index cards provide the emigrant's name, status or occupation, age, names of persons traveling in the same party, and place of origin. It also includes the year of emigration and the page number where the entry will be found. A letter i or d following the year will indicate if the entry was from the indirect or direct index. There are different types of cards used in this file. The figures below show two typical samples of cards from the Klüber Kartei.

#### Using the Regular Indexes

Using the Family History Library Catalog to find the film number, locate the index for the time period the emigrant departed.

Find the year the emigrant departed and the letter of the alphabet with which your ancestor's surname begins. Names are arranged by the first letter of the surname only, so you may need to search the entire section to find the person you are looking for. **NOTE:** Each letter of the alphabet was allotted only a certain number of pages. When these pages were filled, the rest of the names beginning with that letter were continued on the unused pages under another letter. There may or may not be a note indicating this happened. Therefore, search all of the end pages assigned to other letters if your ancestor's name is not listed where it should be.

Figure 3 below is a sample of an entry from the regular index. The actual format of the indexes vary over time. Notice the type of information provided within these entries.

An index entry contains:

- 1. The name of the ship.
- 2. The departure date of the ship (28 June 1893).
- 3. The passenger's name.
- 4. The name of the ship's captain.
- 5. The name of the destination port.
- 6. The page this information is found on the actual passenger lists.

When you find the emigrant in the index, note the number following the name (see number 6 in figure 3). This number indicates which page the name appears on in the passenger list. In some cases page numbers are dittoed, referring to the previous page. Occasionally, large page numbers are partially dittoed. For example, pages 1086, 1087, and 1088 might appear as 1086, 87, 88.

Next, move up the column until you find the departure date (see number 2 in figure 3). When you have both the departure date and page number, you are ready to find the emigrant in the passenger list.

If you cannot find a person in the index to the direct lists, follow the steps outlined here to search the index to the Indirect Lists.

#### CAN'T FIND YOUR ANCESTOR IN THE INDEXES?

If you cannot find an emigrant in the indexes, there are several possible reasons.

- The emigrant did not sail from Hamburg. He or she may have sailed from one of several other ports in Europe, most of which have few or no records available.
- 2. The person was listed on another page because the first page was full. Search the end sections of other letters of the alphabet.
- 3. The name was spelled differently than it appears in your records. Look for alternate spellings of the name.
- 4. The person emigrated at a different date.

#### STEP 3: OBTAIN THE DESIRED PASSENGER LIST.

Once you have found your ancestor in an index, you will want to get the actual passenger list on which that person appears. Film numbers for the passengers lists appear after the regular indexes in the Family History Library Catalog.

#### STEP 4: SEARCH THE PASSENGER LIST.

In the passenger list, turn to the page number you found in the index. On some passenger lists a numbered page is followed by one or more unnumbered pages. If your ancestor's name does not appear on the numbered page, search the unnumbered page(s) immediately following it. Figure 4 shows an example of a passenger list. Format and titles may vary by shipping line and year.
